BEST (Building Employment **S**kills for **T**omorrow) is an on-the-job training program that teaches homeless, mentally ill or recovering individuals janitorial, repair and light remodeling skills.

Independence Housing Program helps employed people find market-rate housing.

Living Skills Center Program offers six-week courses on nutrition, budgeting, decision-making, and parenting.

Rosati Center Program is a residential care facility that provides 29 beds in transitional housing for homeless mentally ill individuals who have been referred from agencies or hospitals. Residents receive counseling and learn daily-living skills.

Women's Shelter Program provides homeless, mentally ill or chemically dependent women with a safe place at night and Shamrock Club services in the daytime.
