I recently had the honor of attending the memorial services of a fallen soldier. CW3 Michael Lee Hartwick Jr. was raised in the Orrick area, married a local girl, and fathered a daughter and a son. CW3 Hartwick piloted an AH-64 Apache Helicopter for the U.S. Army in Iraq. He was buried on Good Friday.

Regardless whether you are a "hawk" or a "dove," we can all agree Hartwick and those that have fallen before him are all American heroes.

Orrick is a town of 922 people; 14 young men from this community have served or continue to serve in Iraq. Many of our communities in Rural Missouri proudly have similar records of service in this and other military operations.

It has been said that roughly 43 percent of the Armed Forces are people from towns with populations less than 5,000. This group represents just 19 percent of the U.S. population. It's my feeling that these young people grow up defending their communities, their faith, and their values and naturally grow into defending our country. They make us all proud of where we're from.

To say that CW3 Hartwick's memorial service was both heart-warming and gutwrenching is an understatement. It was an amazing celebration of his life and passion for God and country.

Afterwards, Patriot Guard Riders, a diverse group of motorcyclists from across the nation helped lead the funeral procession to Orrick. Nearly 250 riders joined the 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> mile funeral procession from Liberty into Ray County. They passed by cars stopped alongside the road — men, women, and children silenced in respect. American flags blew in the spring wind throughout the entire town.

After the playing of Taps at the burial, three Apaches flew over the grave, hovering overhead. In a flash, the two flanking choppers left the center. The remaining chopper, moved skyward, hovering over the grave. Slowly, the remaining Apache joined the others in the far distance.

The Highway Patrol, Liberty Police, and the sheriff's departments of Clay and Ray counties did an excellent job of providing for the needs of mourners. I commend local law enforcement for assisting with the needs of these fellow heroes.

Afterwards, the Major General turned to me and said he had never experienced anything like this before. All I could say is, "Welcome to Rural Missouri."
