Not only do some of these groups provide warm meals and a roof over the heads of our state's citizens in need, they provide faith and hope for those who need it the most.

Another measure that passed last session, House Bill 453, increases opportunities for needy Missourians to receive adequate nutrition through local food banks by encouraging individuals and businesses to donate food or cash to local food pantries.
