## AN ACT

To repeal sections 160.254, 160.530, and 168.021, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof four new sections relating solely to teacher certification.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 160.254, 160.530, and 168.021, RSMo, are repealed 2 and four new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 160.254, 3 160.530, 168.021, and 1, to read as follows:

160.254. 1. There is hereby established a joint committee of the general assembly, which shall be known as the "Joint Committee on Education", which shall be composed of seven members of the senate and seven members of the house of representatives. The senate members of the committee shall be appointed by the president pro tem of the senate and the house members by the speaker of the house.

7 2. The committee shall meet at least twice a year. In the event of three
8 consecutive absences on the part of any member, such member may be removed
9 from the committee.

3. The committee shall select either a chairman or cochairmen, one of
whom shall be a member of the senate and one a member of the house. A
majority of the members shall constitute a quorum. Meetings of the committee
may be called at such time and place as the chairman or chairmen designate.

14 4. The committee shall:

15 (1) Review and monitor the progress of education in the state's public16 schools and institutions of higher education;

17 (2) Receive reports from the commissioner of education concerning the 18 public schools and from the commissioner of higher education concerning 19 institutions of higher education;

20 (3) Conduct a study and analysis of the public school system;

21 (4) Make recommendations to the general assembly for legislative action;

(5) Conduct an in-depth study concerning all issues relating to the equity and adequacy of the distribution of state school aid, teachers' salaries, funding for school buildings, and overall funding levels for schools and any other education funding-related issues the committee deems relevant;

(6) Monitor the establishment of performance measures as required by
section 173.1006, RSMo, and report on their establishment to the governor and
the general assembly;

29 (7) Conduct studies and analysis regarding:

30 (a) The higher education system, including financing public higher31 education and the provision of financial aid for higher education; and

32 (b) The feasibility of including students enrolled in proprietary schools,
33 as that term is defined in section 173.600, RSMo, in all state-based financial aid
34 programs;

(8) Annually review the collection of information under section 173.093,
RSMo, to facilitate a more accurate comparison of the actual costs at public and
private higher education institutions;

(9) Within three years of August 28, 2007, review a new model for the
funding of public higher education institutions upon submission of such model by
the coordinating board for higher education;

41 (10) Within three years of August 28, 2007, review the impact of the
42 higher education student funding act established in sections 173.1000 to
43 173.1006;

44 (11) Beginning August 28, 2008, upon review, approve or deny
45 any expenditures made by the commissioner of education pursuant to
46 section 160.530, as provided in subsection 5 of section 160.530.

475. The committee may make reasonable requests for staff assistance from the research and appropriations staffs of the house and senate and the committee 4849on legislative research, as well as the department of elementary and secondary education, the department of higher education, the coordinating board for higher 50education, the state tax commission, the department of economic development, all 5152school districts and other political subdivisions of this state, teachers and teacher groups, business and other commercial interests and any other interested 5354persons.

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6. Members of the committee shall receive no compensation but may be

56 reimbursed for reasonable and necessary expenses associated with the 57 performance of their official duties.

160.530. 1. Beginning with fiscal year 1994 and for all fiscal years thereafter, in order to be eligible for state aid distributed pursuant to section 2 163.031, RSMo, a school district shall allocate one percent of moneys received 3 pursuant to section 163.031, RSMo, exclusive of categorical add-ons, to the 4 professional development committee of the district as established in subdivision 5(1) of subsection 4 of section 168.400, RSMo. Of the moneys allocated to the 6 professional development committee in any fiscal year as specified by this 7 subsection, seventy-five percent of such funds shall be spent in the same fiscal 8 year for purposes determined by the professional development committee after 9 consultation with the administrators of the school district and approved by the 10 local board of education as meeting the objectives of a school improvement plan 11 12of the district that has been developed by the local board. Moneys expended for staff training pursuant to any provisions of this act shall not be considered in 13determining the requirements for school districts imposed by this subsection. 14

2. Beginning with fiscal year 1994 and for all fiscal years thereafter, 15eighteen million dollars [of the moneys appropriated to the department of 16 elementary and secondary education otherwise distributed to the public schools 17of the state pursuant to the provisions of section 163.031, RSMo, exclusive of 1819 categorical add-ons,] shall be distributed by the commissioner of education to 20address statewide areas of critical need for learning and development, provided that such disbursements are approved by the joint committee on 2122education as provided in subsection 5 of this section, and as determined 23by rule and regulation of the state board of education with the advice of the commission established by section 160.510 and the advisory council provided by 24subsection 1 of section 168.015, RSMo. The moneys described in this subsection 2526may be distributed by the commissioner of education to colleges, universities, private associations, professional education associations, statewide associations 2728organized for the benefit of members of boards of education, public elementary 29and secondary schools, and other associations and organizations that provide professional development opportunities for teachers, administrators, family 30 literacy personnel and boards of education for the purpose of addressing 31 statewide areas of critical need, provided that subdivisions (1), (2) and (3) of this 32subsection shall constitute priority uses for such moneys. "Statewide areas of 33critical need for learning and development" shall include: 34

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(1) Funding the operation of state management teams in districts with

36 academically deficient schools and providing resources specified by the 37 management team as needed in such districts;

(2) Funding for grants to districts, upon application to the department of
elementary and secondary education, for resources identified as necessary by the
district, for those districts which are failing to achieve assessment standards;

41 (3) Funding for family literacy programs;

42 (4) Ensuring that all children, especially children at risk, children with43 special needs, and gifted students are successful in school;

44 (5) Increasing parental involvement in the education of their children;

45 (6) Providing information which will assist public school administrators
46 and teachers in understanding the process of site-based decision making;

47 (7) Implementing recommended curriculum frameworks as outlined in48 section 160.514;

49 (8) Training in new assessment techniques for students;

50 (9) Cooperating with law enforcement authorities to expand successful
51 antidrug programs for students;

52 (10) Strengthening existing curricula of local school districts to stress53 drug and alcohol prevention;

54 (11) Implementing and promoting programs to combat gang activity in55 urban areas of the state;

56 (12) Establishing family schools, whereby such schools adopt proven 57 models of one-stop state services for children and families;

58 (13) Expanding adult literacy services; and

(14) Training of members of boards of education in the areas deemed
important for the training of effective board members as determined by the state
board of education.

3. Beginning with fiscal year 1994 and for all fiscal years thereafter, two 62million dollars of the moneys appropriated to the department of elementary and 63 64secondary education otherwise distributed to the public schools of the state 65pursuant to the provisions of section 163.031, RSMo, exclusive of categorical 66 add-ons, shall be distributed in grant awards by the state board of education, by rule and regulation, for the "Success Leads to Success" grant program, which is 67hereby created. The purpose of the success leads to success grant program shall 68be to recognize, disseminate and exchange information about the best professional 69 teaching practices and programs in the state that address student needs, and to 70encourage the staffs of schools with these practices and programs to develop 71school-to-school networks to share these practices and programs. 72

4. The department shall include a listing of all expenditures under this
section in the annual budget documentation presented to the governor and
general assembly.

76 5. Prior to distributing any funds under subsection 2 of this 77 section, the commissioner of education shall appear before the joint committee on education and present a proposed delineation of the 7879programs to be funded under the provisions of subsection 2 of this 80 section. The joint committee shall review all proposed spending under subsection 2 of this section and shall affirm, by a majority vote of all 81 82members serving on the committee, the spending proposal of the 83 commissioner prior to any disbursement of funds under subsection 2 of 84 this section.

6. If any provision of subdivision (11) of subsection 4 of section 160.254 or any provision of subsections 2 or 5 of this section regarding approval of disbursements by the joint committee on education are held to be invalid for any reason, then such decision shall invalidate subsection 2 of this section in its entirety.

168.021. 1. Certificates of license to teach in the public schools of the 2 state shall be granted as follows:

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(1) By the state board, under rules and regulations prescribed by it,

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(a) Upon the basis of college credit;(b) Upon the basis of examination;

6 (2) By the state board, under rules and regulations prescribed by the state board with advice from the advisory council established by section 168.015 to any 7 8 individual who presents to the state board a valid doctoral degree from an accredited institution of higher education accredited by a regional accrediting 9 association such as North Central Association. Such certificate shall be limited 10 to the major area of postgraduate study of the holder, shall be issued only after 11 12successful completion of the examination required for graduation pursuant to rules adopted by the state board of education, and shall be restricted to those 13certificates established pursuant to subdivision (1) of subsection 3 of this section; 14[or] 15

16 (3) By the state board, which shall issue the professional certificate 17 classification in both the general and specialized areas most closely aligned with 18 the current areas of certification approved by the state board, commensurate with 19 the years of teaching experience of the applicant, and based upon the following 20 criteria: (a) Recommendation of a state-approved baccalaureate-level teacher
 preparation program;

(b) Successful attainment of the Missouri qualifying score on the exit
assessment for teachers or administrators designated by the state board of
education. Applicants who have not successfully achieved a qualifying score on
the designated examinations will be issued a two-year nonrenewable provisional
certificate; and

(c) Upon completion of a background check and possession of a valid
teaching certificate in the state from which the applicant's teacher preparation
program was completed; or

31(4) By the state board, under rules and regulations prescribed by it, on the basis of certification by the American Board for Certification 32of Teacher Excellence (ABCTE) and verification of ability to work with 3334children as demonstrated by sixty contact hours in any one of the following areas as validated by the school principal: sixty contact 35hours in the classroom, of which at least forty-five must be teaching; 36 37sixty contact hours as a substitute teacher, with at least thirty 38consecutive hours in the same classroom; sixty contact hours of 39teaching in a private school; or sixty contact hours of teaching as a paraprofessional, for an initial four-year ABCTE certificate of license 40to teach, except that such certificate shall not be granted for the areas 41 42of early childhood education, elementary education, or special education. Upon the completion of the requirements listed in 43paragraphs (a), (b), (c), and (d) of this subdivision, an applicant shall 44 be eligible to apply for a career continuous professional certificate 45under subdivision (2) of subsection 3 of this section: 46

47 (a) Completion of thirty contact hours of professional
48 development within four years, which may include hours spent in class
49 in an appropriate college curriculum;

(b) Validated completion of two years of the mentoring program
of the American Board for Certification of Teacher Excellence or a
district mentoring program approved by the state board of education;
(c) Attainment of a successful performance-based teacher
evaluation; and

55 (d) Participate in a beginning teacher assistance program.

56 2. All valid teaching certificates issued pursuant to law or state board 57 policies and regulations prior to September 1, 1988, shall be exempt from the 58professional development requirements of this section and shall continue in effect 59until they expire, are revoked or suspended, as provided by law. When such 60 certificates are required to be renewed, the state board or its designee shall grant 61 to each holder of such a certificate the certificate most nearly equivalent to the one so held. Anyone who holds, as of August 28, 2003, a valid PC-I, PC-II, or 62 continuous professional certificate shall, upon expiration of his or her current 63 certificate, be issued the appropriate level of certificate based upon the 64 classification system established pursuant to subsection 3 of this section. 65

66 3. Certificates of license to teach in the public schools of the state shall 67 be based upon minimum requirements prescribed by the state board of 68 education. The state board shall provide for the following levels of professional 69 certification: an initial professional certificate and a career continuous 70 professional certificate.

(1) The initial professional certificate shall be issued upon completion of requirements established by the state board of education and shall be valid based upon verification of actual teaching within a specified time period established by the state board of education. The state board shall require holders of the four-year initial professional certificate to:

(a) Participate in a mentoring program approved and provided by thedistrict for a minimum of two years;

(b) Complete thirty contact hours of professional development, which mayinclude hours spent in class in an appropriate college curriculum; and

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(c) Participate in a beginning teacher assistance program;

(2) (a) The career continuous professional certificate shall be issued upon
verification of completion of four years of teaching under the initial professional
certificate and upon verification of the completion of the requirements articulated
in paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of subdivision (1) of this subsection or paragraphs
(a), (b), (c), and (d) of subdivision (4) of subsection 1 of this section.

86 (b) The career continuous professional certificate shall be continuous based upon verification of actual employment in an educational position as 87 88 provided for in state board guidelines and completion of fifteen contact hours of professional development per year which may include hours spent in class in an 89 90 appropriate college curriculum. Should the possessor of a valid career continuous professional certificate fail, in any given year, to meet the fifteen-hour 9192professional development requirement, the possessor may, within two years, make up the missing hours. In order to make up for missing hours, the possessor shall 93 first complete the fifteen-hour requirement for the current year and then may 94

95count hours in excess of the current year requirement as make-up hours. Should 96 the possessor fail to make up the missing hours within two years, the certificate shall become inactive. In order to reactivate the certificate, the possessor shall 97complete twenty-four contact hours of professional development which may 98 include hours spent in the classroom in an appropriate college curriculum within 99 the six months prior to or after reactivating his or her certificate. The 100 requirements of this paragraph shall be monitored and verified by the local school 101 district which employs the holder of the career continuous professional certificate. 102103(c) A holder of a career continuous professional certificate shall be exempt 104from the professional development contact hour requirements of paragraph (b) of this subdivision if such teacher has a local professional development plan in place 105within such teacher's school district and meets two of the three following criteria: 106

a. Has ten years of teaching experience as defined by the state board ofeducation;

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b. Possesses a master's degree; or

c. Obtains a rigorous national certification as approved by the state boardof education.

4. Policies and procedures shall be established by which a teacher who 112was not retained due to a reduction in force may retain the current level of 113certification. There shall also be established policies and procedures allowing a 114115teacher who has not been employed in an educational position for three years or more to reactivate his or her last level of certification by completing twenty-four 116contact hours of professional development which may include hours spent in the 117 classroom in an appropriate college curriculum within the six months prior to or 118after reactivating his or her certificate. 119

1205. The state board shall, upon an appropriate background check, issue a professional certificate classification in the areas most closely aligned with an 121applicant's current areas of certification, commensurate with the years of 122teaching experience of the applicant, to any person who is hired to teach in a 123124public school in this state and who possesses a valid teaching certificate from 125another state, provided that the certificate holder shall annually complete the state board's requirements for such level of certification, and shall establish 126127policies by which residents of states other than the state of Missouri may be assessed a fee for a certificate license to teach in the public schools of 128129Missouri. Such fee shall be in an amount sufficient to recover any or all costs associated with the issuing of a certificate of license to teach. 130

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6. The state board may assess to holders of an initial professional

132certificate a fee, to be deposited into the excellence in education revolving fund 133established pursuant to section 160.268, RSMo, for the issuance of the career continuous professional certificate. However, such fee shall not exceed the 134135combined costs of issuance and any criminal background check required as a 136 condition of issuance. Applicants for the initial ABCTE certificate shall be responsible for any fees associated with the program leading to the 137 138 issuance of the certificate, but nothing in this section shall prohibit a 139district from developing a policy that permits fee reimbursement.

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140 7. Any member of the public school retirement system of Missouri who 141 entered covered employment with ten or more years of educational experience in 142 another state or states and held a certificate issued by another state and 143 subsequently worked in a school district covered by the public school retirement 144 system of Missouri for ten or more years who later became certificated in 145 Missouri shall have that certificate dated back to his or her original date of 146 employment in a Missouri public school.

8. The provisions of subdivision (4) of subsection 1 of this
section, as well as any other provision of this section relating to the
American Board for Certification of Teacher Excellence, shall terminate
on August 28, 2014.

Section 1. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, 2 the state auditor shall have the power to audit any school district 3 within the state in the same manner as the auditor may audit any 4 agency of the state.
