#### JOINT RESOLUTION

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment repealing section 5 of article I of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section in lieu thereof relating to religious freedom.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2012, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article I of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 5, article I, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and 2 one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 5, to read as 3 follows:

Section 5. That all men and women have a natural and indefeasible  $\mathbf{2}$ right to worship Almighty God according to the dictates of their own consciences; that no human authority can control or interfere with the rights of conscience; 3 that no person shall, on account of his or her religious persuasion or belief, be 4 5rendered ineligible to any public office or trust or profit in this state, be disqualified from testifying or serving as a juror, or be molested in his person or 6 estate; that to secure a citizen's right to acknowledge God according to 7 the dictates of his or her own conscience, neither the state nor any of 8 its political subdivisions shall establish any official religion, nor shall 9 a citizen's right to pray or express his or her religious beliefs be 1011 infringed; that the state shall not coerce any person to participate in 12any prayer or other religious activity, but shall ensure that any person shall have the right to pray individually or corporately in a private or 13public setting so long as such prayer does not result in disturbance of 14

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the peace or disruption of a public meeting or assembly or impede public access; that citizens as well as elected officials and employees of the state of Missouri and its political subdivisions shall have the right to pray and to acknowledge God and express their religious beliefs on government premises and public property so long as such prayers and

government premises and public property so long as such prayers and 19other expressions abide within the same parameters placed upon any 20other free speech under similar circumstances; that the general 21assembly and the governing bodies of political subdivisions may 2223solemnize public proceedings by extending to ministers, clergypersons, and other individuals the invitation to offer invocations or other 24prayers at meetings or sessions of the general assembly or governing 25bodies; that the state shall ensure public school students their right to 26free exercise of religious expression without interference, as long as 27such prayer, acknowledgment of God, or other expression is private 2829and voluntary, whether individually or corporately, and in a manner 30 that is not disruptive and as long as such prayers or expressions abide within the same parameters placed upon any other free speech under 3132similar circumstances; that students may express their beliefs about 33religion in written and oral assignments free from discrimination based 34on the religious content of their work; that no student shall be 35compelled to perform or participate in academic assignments or educational presentations that violate their religious beliefs; and, to 36 37emphasize the right to free exercise of religious expression, that all free public schools receiving state appropriation shall display, in a 38conspicuous and legible manner, the text of the Bill of Rights of the 39United States Constitution; but this section shall not be construed to expand 4041 the rights of prisoners in state or local custody beyond those afforded by the laws of the United States, excuse acts of licentiousness, nor to justify 42practices inconsistent with the good order, peace or safety of the state, or with the 43rights of others. 44

Section B. Pursuant to chapter 116, RSMo, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of a joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official ballot title of the amendment proposed in section A of this resolution shall be as follows:

"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to ensure:

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7 • That the right of Missouri citizens to express their religious beliefs

8		shall not be infringed;
9	•	That school children have the right to pray and acknowledge God
10		voluntarily in their schools; and
11	•	That all public schools shall display the Bill of Rights of the United
12		States Constitution.".
