## AN ACT

To amend chapter 37, RSMo, by adding thereto one new section relating to the council on digital inclusion.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 37, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto one new section, to be known as section 37.050, to read as follows:

37.050. 1. The "Council on Digital Inclusion" is hereby

- 2 created. The council shall be composed of eight individuals appointed
- 3 by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate. Each of the
- following groups shall be represented on the council:
- 5 (1) Community technology organizations;
- 6 (2) Telecommunications providers;
- 7 (3) Higher education;
- 8 (4) Elementary and secondary education;
- 9 (5) Public health;
- 10 (6) Public housing;
- 11 (7) Local government entities engaged in community technology
- 12 activities; and
- 13 (8) The office of administration.
- 14 2. Each individual shall be appointed to the council for three
- 15 years, except that the terms of the original appointments may be
- 16 staggered so as to prevent more than three terms from ever expiring in
- 17 the same year. Individuals may be reappointed. The council may meet
- 18 at its discretion as it deems necessary to fulfill its duties, but shall not
- 19 meet less than four times per year. Council members shall not receive
- 20 compensation for their duties but shall receive reimbursement for
- 21 expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

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- 22 3. The council shall:
- 23 (1) Serve in an advisory capacity to the office of administration 24 regarding broadband deployment and digital inclusion;
- 25 (2) Make recommendations regarding broadband access and 26 digital inclusion initiatives in communities and schools to ensure 27 equitable access for all citizens of the state;
- (3) Undertake a thorough review of grant programs available through the federal government, local agencies, telecommunications providers, and business and charitable entities for the purposes of identifying appropriate sources of revenues for broadband deployment and digital inclusion initiatives and attempt to update available grants on a regular basis;
- 34 (4) Analyze how support from public and private sector 35 partnerships, the philanthropic community, and other not-for-profit 36 organizations in the community, along with strong relationships with 37 the state board of education and higher education institutions, builds 38 a sustainable infrastructure that provides a variety of digital access 39 alternatives for citizens;
- 40 (5) Plan for long-term technological sustainability to help the 41 state meet a variety of economic, health care, environmental, and 42 educational goals and ensure prolonged access to economic opportunity 43 in our digital economy;
- 44 (6) Research and catalog programs designed to advance digital 45 literacy and computer access that are available through the federal 46 government, local agencies, telecommunications providers, and 47 business and charitable entities and attempt to update available 48 programs on a regular basis; and
- 49 (7) Present the information compiled under this section to the 50 office of administration, which is the main point of contact for state 51 broadband and digital inclusion initiatives.

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
