#### JOINT RESOLUTION

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment repealing section 5 of article I of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section in lieu thereof relating to religious freedom.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on 2 Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2012, or at a special 3 election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted 4 to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following 5 amendment to article I of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 5, article I, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and 2 one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 5, to read as 3 follows:

Section 5. That all men and women have a natural and indefeasible right to worship Almighty God according to the dictates of their own consciences; 2 that no human authority can control or interfere with the rights of conscience; 3 4 that no person shall, on account of his or her religious persuasion or belief, be rendered ineligible to any public office or trust or profit in this state, be  $\mathbf{5}$ 6 disqualified from testifying or serving as a juror, or be molested in his person or 7 estate; that to secure a citizen's right to acknowledge Almighty God 8 according to the dictates of his or her own conscience, neither the state 9 nor any of its political subdivisions shall establish any official religion, 10 nor shall a citizen's right to pray or express his or her religious beliefs be infringed; that the state shall not coerce any person to participate 11 in any prayer or other religious activity, but shall ensure that any 1213person shall have the right to pray individually or corporately in a

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14private or public setting so long as such prayer does not result in 15disturbance of the peace or disruption of a public meeting or assembly 16or impede public access; that citizens as well as elected officials and employees of the state of Missouri and its political subdivisions shall 17have the right to pray and to acknowledge God and express their 18religious beliefs on government premises and public property so long 19as such prayers and other expressions abide within the same 20parameters placed upon any other free speech under similar 2122circumstances; that the general assembly and the governing bodies of 23political subdivisions may solemnize public proceedings by extending to ministers, clergypersons, and other individuals the invitation to offer 24invocations or other prayers at meetings or sessions of the general 25assembly or governing bodies; that the state shall ensure public school 2627students their right to free exercise of religious expression without interference, as long as such prayer, acknowledgment of God, or other 2829expression is private and voluntary, whether individually or corporately, and in a manner that is not disruptive and as long as such 30 31prayers or expressions abide within the same parameters placed upon 32any other free speech under similar circumstances; that students may 33 express their beliefs about religion in written and oral assignments free 34from discrimination based on the religious content of their work; that no student shall be compelled to perform or participate in academic 3536 assignments or educational presentations that violate their religious 37beliefs; and, to emphasize the right to free exercise of religious expression, that all free public schools receiving state appropriation 38shall display, in a conspicuous and legible manner, the text of the Bill 3940 of Rights of the United States Constitution; but this section shall not be construed to expand the rights of prisoners in state or local custody 41beyond those afforded by the laws of the United States, excuse acts of 42licentiousness, nor to justify practices inconsistent with the good order, peace or 43safety of the state, or with the rights of others. 44

Section B. Pursuant to chapter 116, RSMo, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of a joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official ballot title of the amendment proposed in section A of this resolution shall be as follows:

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"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to ensure:

7	•	That the right of Missouri citizens to express their religious beliefs
8		shall not be infringed;
9	•	That school children have the right to pray and acknowledge God
10		voluntarily in their schools; and
11	•	That all public schools shall display the Bill of Rights of the United
12		States Constitution.".
