AN ACT

To repeal section 163.191, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof eleven new sections relating to higher education.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 163.191, RSMo, is repealed and eleven

2 new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 163.191, 173.1500, 173.1505, 173.1510, 173.1515, 173.1520, 3 173.1525, 173.1527, 173.1529, 173.1530, and 173.1535, to read as follows: 163.191. 1. Each year public community colleges in the aggregate shall be eligible to receive from state funds, if state funds are available and appropriated, an amount [up to but not 8 9 more than fifty percent] of the state community colleges' planned 10 operating costs as determined by the [department of] higher 11 education funding model under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535. 12 used in this subsection, the term "year" means from July first to 13 June thirtieth of the following year. As used in this subsection, the term "operating costs" means all costs 14 15 attributable to current operations, including all direct costs of instruction, instructors' and counselors' compensation, 16

      administrative costs, all normal operating costs and all similar

      noncapital expenditures during any year, excluding costs of
 3
      construction of facilities and the purchase of equipment,

      furniture, and other capital items authorized and funded in

      accordance with subsection 2 of this section. Operating costs
 6
      shall be computed in accordance with accounting methods and

      procedures to be specified by the department of higher education.

      The department of higher education shall review all institutional
9
      budget requests and prepare appropriation recommendations
10
      annually for the community colleges under the supervision of the
      department. The department's budget request shall include a

      recommended level of funding. Distribution of appropriated funds
13
      to community college districts shall be in accordance with the

      [community college resource allocation model. This model shall

      be developed and revised as appropriate cooperatively by the
      community colleges and the department of higher education.

      department of higher education shall recommend the model to the

      coordinating board for higher education for their approval.

      core funding level for each community college shall initially be
20
      established at an amount agreed upon by the community colleges
21
      and the department of higher education. This amount will be
22
      adjusted annually for inflation, limited growth, and program
23
      improvements in accordance with the resource allocation model
24
      starting with fiscal year 1993] higher education funding model
25
      established in sections 173.1500 to 173.1535, using the

state aid funds for any new districts for their first six years 1 2 of operation. The request for the new districts shall be based upon the same level of funding being provided to the existing 3 4 districts, and should be sufficient to provide for the growth 5 required to reach a mature enrollment level. [The department of 6 higher education will be responsible for evaluating the 7 effectiveness of the resource allocation model and will submit a 8 report to the speaker of the house of representatives and 9 president pro tem of the senate by November 1997, and every four 10 vears thereafter.1

In addition to state funds received for operating purposes, each community college district shall be eligible to receive an annual appropriation, exclusive of any capital appropriations, for the cost of maintenance and repair of facilities and grounds, including surface parking areas, and purchases of equipment and furniture. Such funds shall not exceed in any year an amount equal to ten percent of the state appropriations, exclusive of any capital appropriations, to community college districts for operating purposes during the most recently completed fiscal year. The department of higher education may include in its annual appropriations request the necessary funds to implement the provisions of this subsection and when appropriated shall distribute the funds to each community college district as appropriated. The department of higher education appropriations request shall be for specific maintenance, repair, and equipment projects at specific community college districts, shall be in an amount of fifty percent of the cost of a given project as determined by the coordinating board

- and shall be only for projects which have been approved by the coordinating board through a process of application, evaluation, and approval as established by the coordinating board. coordinating board, as part of its process of application, evaluation, and approval, shall require the community college district to provide proof that the fifty-percent share of funding to be defrayed by the district is either on hand or committed for maintenance, repair, and equipment projects. Only salaries or portions of salaries paid which are directly related to approved projects may be used as a part of the fifty-percent share of funding.
 - 3. School districts offering two-year college courses pursuant to section 178.370 on October 31, 1961, shall receive state aid pursuant to subsections 1 and 2 of this section if all scholastic standards established pursuant to sections 178.770 to 178.890 are met.

4. In order to make postsecondary educational opportunities available to Missouri residents who do not reside in an existing community college district, community colleges organized pursuant to section 178.370 or sections 178.770 to 178.890 shall be authorized pursuant to the funding provisions of this section to offer courses and programs outside the community college district with prior approval by the coordinating board for higher education. The classes conducted outside the district shall be self-sustaining except that the coordinating board shall promulgate rules to reimburse selected out-of-district instruction only where prior need has been established in geographical areas designated by the coordinating board for

- 1 higher education. Funding for such off-campus instruction shall
- 2 be included in the appropriation recommendations, shall be
- 3 determined by the general assembly and shall continue, within the
- 4 amounts appropriated therefor, unless the general assembly
- 5 disapproves the action by concurrent resolution.
- 6 5. A "community college" is an institution of higher
- 7 education deriving financial resources from local, state, and
- 8 federal sources, and providing postsecondary education primarily
- 9 for persons above the twelfth grade age level, including courses
- 10 in:
- 11 (1) Liberal arts and sciences, including general education;
- 12 (2) Occupational, vocational-technical; and
- 13 (3) A variety of educational community services.
- 14 Community college course offerings lead to the granting of
- 15 certificates, diplomas, and/or associate degrees, but do not
- include baccalaureate or higher degrees.
- 17 6. When distributing state aid authorized for community
- 18 colleges, the state treasurer may, in any year if requested by a
- 19 community college, disregard the provision in section 30.180
- 20 requiring the state treasurer to convert the warrant requesting
- 21 payment into a check or draft and wire transfer the amount to be
- 22 distributed to the community college directly to the community
- 23 college's designated deposit for credit to the community
- 24 college's account.

22	"IPEDS", the system of interrelated educational data surveys
23	reported annually to the National Center for Education Statistics
24	of the United States Department of Education by every institution

27	a Carnegie classification of master's college or university;
28	(9) "Operating budget estimate", the dollar amount derived

- 7 are not included in core operating expenditures and therefore not
- 8 directly appropriated for through the major line item operating
- 9 appropriation, including but not limited to scholarships,
- 10 auxiliary enterprises, hospital services, and independent
- 11 <u>operations;</u>
- 12 (11) "Peer comparison group", the public institutions from
- the peer states that are designated by the same Carnegie
- classification as a Missouri institution's sector, with the
- 15 exception of Linn State Technical College;
- 16 (12) "Peer states", the group of ten states comprised of
- 17 the five states next higher than Missouri and the five states
- 18 next lower than Missouri, based on rank-ordering of all states
- according to the Bureau of Economic Analysis based on the 2011
- 20 midyear population estimates of the census data for the per
- 21 <u>capita personal income</u>. The rank-ordering of all states
- 22 according to the Bureau of Economic Analysis using midyear
- 23 population estimates of the census data for the per capita
- 24 personal income shall be recalculated decennially based on the
- 25 previous census;
- 26 (13) "Pell threshold", the median value of the sector's
- 27 peer comparison group's rank ordered list of institutions'
- 28 percentage of students receiving a Pell grant;

2	value over the Pell threshold;
3	(15) "Performance funding", that portion of the annual
4	operating budget estimate that is derived from applying the
5	institutional performance measures as approved by the

8	(16) "Research classified institution", an institution with
9	a Carnegie classification of a research university;
10	(17) "Sector", the designation of a public institution,
11	based on Carnegie classification, as associate's, baccalaureate,
12	master's, or research, with the exception of Linn State Technical
13	College, which is designated in the statewide technical education
14	<pre>institution sector;</pre>
15	(18) "Sector specific modifier", the median of the rank
16	ordered list of institutions in a sector peer comparison group
17	using, for each institution, the quotient of:

6	173.1505. 1. The public institutions of higher education
7	shall be categorized into sectors in the following manner:
8	(1) The associate's sector shall include the community
9	colleges and the West Plains campus of Missouri State University;
10	(2) The statewide technical education institution sector
11	shall include Linn State Technical College;
12	(3) The baccalaureate sector shall include Harris-Stowe
13	State University, Missouri Southern State University, and
14	Missouri Western State University;
15	(4) The master's sector shall include Lincoln University,
16	Missouri State University, Northwest Missouri State University,
17	Southeast Missouri State University, Truman State University, and
18	the University of Central Missouri; and
19	(5) The research sector shall include the University of
20	Missouri.

- 3 <u>2. Performance funds shall be directed into the "Higher</u>
 4 Education Performance Fund".
- 5 3. The coordinating board for higher education shall

In accordance with sections 30.170 and 6 30.180, the state treasurer may approve disbursements. The fund 7 shall be a dedicated fund and, upon appropriation, money in the 8 fund shall be used solely for the administration of this section. 9 Any moneys remaining in the fund at the end of the biennium shall 10 revert to the credit of the general revenue fund. The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in the same manner as 11 other funds are invested. Any interest and moneys earned on such 12 13 investments shall be credited to the fund.

When conducting its 8 9 review, the joint committee shall consult with the coordinating 10 board for higher education, the department of higher education, at least two academic researchers, the Midwest Higher Education 11 12 Compact, and the Education Commission of the States, and may 13 consult with any education foundation that regularly conducts 14 research in the area of state funding for higher education. 15 2.
