AN ACT

To repeal section 163.191, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof nine new sections relating to higher education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 163.191, RSMo, is repealed and nine new sections

- 2 enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 163.191, 173.1500, 173.1505,
- 3 173.1510, 173.1515, 173.1520, 173.1525, 173.1530, and 173.1535, to read as
- 4 follows:

163.191. 1. Each year public community colleges in the aggregate shall

- e be eligible to receive from state funds, if state funds are available and
- B appropriated, an amount [up to but not more than fifty percent] of the state
- 4 community colleges' planned operating costs as determined by the [department
- of higher education funding model under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535. As
- 6 used in this subsection, the term "year" means from July first to June thirtieth
- 7 of the following year. As used in this subsection, the term "operating costs"
- 8 means all costs attributable to current operations, including all direct costs of
- 9 instruction, instructors' and counselors' compensation, administrative costs, all
- 10 normal operating costs and all similar noncapital expenditures during any year,
- 11 excluding costs of construction of facilities and the purchase of equipment,
- 12 furniture, and other capital items authorized and funded in accordance with
- 13 subsection 2 of this section. Operating costs shall be computed in accordance
- 14 with accounting methods and procedures to be specified by the department of
- 15 higher education. The department of higher education shall review all
- 16 institutional budget requests and prepare appropriation recommendations
- 17 annually for the community colleges under the supervision of the

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department. The department's budget request shall include a recommended level 18 19 of funding. Distribution of appropriated funds to community college districts shall be in accordance with the [community college resource allocation 20 21 model. This model shall be developed and revised as appropriate cooperatively 22 by the community colleges and the department of higher education. The department of higher education shall recommend the model to the coordinating 23board for higher education for their approval. The core funding level for each 2425 community college shall initially be established at an amount agreed upon by the 26 community colleges and the department of higher education. This amount will be adjusted annually for inflation, limited growth, and program improvements in 27 accordance with the resource allocation model starting with fiscal year 28 29 1993 higher education funding model established in sections 173.1500 30 to 173.1535, using the calculation for institutions in the associate's 31 sector in subsection 2 of section 173.1515, with each community 32 college's appropriation calculated separately. The department of higher 33 education shall request new and separate state aid funds for any new districts for 34 their first six years of operation. The request for the new districts shall be based upon the same level of funding being provided to the existing districts, and should 35 be sufficient to provide for the growth required to reach a mature enrollment 36 level. [The department of higher education will be responsible for evaluating the 37 effectiveness of the resource allocation model and will submit a report to the 38 39 speaker of the house of representatives and president pro tem of the senate by 40 November 1997, and every four years thereafter.]

2. In addition to state funds received for operating purposes, each community college district shall be eligible to receive an annual appropriation, exclusive of any capital appropriations, for the cost of maintenance and repair of facilities and grounds, including surface parking areas, and purchases of equipment and furniture. Such funds shall not exceed in any year an amount equal to ten percent of the state appropriations, exclusive of any capital appropriations, to community college districts for operating purposes during the most recently completed fiscal year. The department of higher education may include in its annual appropriations request the necessary funds to implement the provisions of this subsection and when appropriated shall distribute the funds to each community college district as appropriated. The department of higher education appropriations request shall be for specific maintenance, repair, and equipment projects at specific community college districts, shall be in an amount

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of fifty percent of the cost of a given project as determined by the coordinating 54 55 board and shall be only for projects which have been approved by the coordinating board through a process of application, evaluation, and approval as established 56 by the coordinating board. The coordinating board, as part of its process of 57 application, evaluation, and approval, shall require the community college district 58 to provide proof that the fifty-percent share of funding to be defrayed by the 59 district is either on hand or committed for maintenance, repair, and equipment 60 projects. Only salaries or portions of salaries paid which are directly related to 61 62 approved projects may be used as a part of the fifty-percent share of funding.

- 3. School districts offering two-year college courses pursuant to section 178.370 on October 31, 1961, shall receive state aid pursuant to subsections 1 and 2 of this section if all scholastic standards established pursuant to sections 178.770 to 178.890 are met.
- 67 4. In order to make postsecondary educational opportunities available to 68 Missouri residents who do not reside in an existing community college district, community colleges organized pursuant to section 178.370 or sections 178.770 to 69 70 178.890 shall be authorized pursuant to the funding provisions of this section to offer courses and programs outside the community college district with prior 7172approval by the coordinating board for higher education. The classes conducted outside the district shall be self-sustaining except that the coordinating board 73 74 shall promulgate rules to reimburse selected out-of-district instruction only where prior need has been established in geographical areas designated by the 75 76 coordinating board for higher education. Funding for such off-campus instruction shall be included in the appropriation recommendations, shall be determined by 78 the general assembly and shall continue, within the amounts appropriated therefor, unless the general assembly disapproves the action by concurrent 79 80 resolution.
- 5. A "community college" is an institution of higher education deriving financial resources from local, state, and federal sources, and providing postsecondary education primarily for persons above the twelfth grade age level, including courses in:
 - (1) Liberal arts and sciences, including general education;
 - (2) Occupational, vocational-technical; and
- 87 (3) A variety of educational community services.
- 88 Community college course offerings lead to the granting of certificates, diplomas, 89 and/or associate degrees, but do not include baccalaureate or higher degrees.

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6. When distributing state aid authorized for community colleges, the state treasurer may, in any year if requested by a community college, disregard the provision in section 30.180 requiring the state treasurer to convert the warrant requesting payment into a check or draft and wire transfer the amount to be distributed to the community college directly to the community college's designated deposit for credit to the community college's account.

173.1500. As used in sections 173.1500 to 173.1535, unless the context requires otherwise, the following terms shall mean:

- 3 (1) "Academic support", the activities and services that support
 4 the institution's primary mission, which shall include but not be limited
 5 to:
- 6 (a) Expenses of activities and services that support the 7 institution's primary missions of instruction, public service, and 8 research;
- 9 (b) The retention, preservation, and display of educational 10 materials, including but not limited to libraries, museums, and 11 galleries;
- 12 (c) Organized activities that provide support services to the 13 academic functions of the institution;
 - (d) Media, including but not limited to audiovisual services;
- 15 (e) Academic administration, including but not limited to 16 academic deans but which shall not include department chairs;
 - (f) Formally organized and separately budgeted academic personnel development and course and curriculum development expenses; and
 - (g) Information technology expenses related to these activities;
- 21 (2) "Associate's degree", an award that normally requires at least 22 two but less than four years of full-time equivalent college work;
 - (3) "Associate's institution", an institution with a Carnegie classification of associate's;
 - (4) "Baccalaureate degree" or "bachelor's degree", an award that normally requires at least four but less than five years of full-time equivalent college-level work, including awards conferred in a five-year cooperative program of work-study. This shall include degrees in which the normal four years of work are completed in three years;
- 30 (5) "Baccalaureate institution", an institution with a Carnegie 31 classification of baccalaureate college;

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32 (6) "Carnegie classification", an institutional classification coding 33 structure developed by the Andrew W. Carnegie Foundation for the 34 advancement of teaching, including updates made in 2010;

- (7) "Core operating expenditures", total expenditures for the essential education activities of the institution, which shall include the institution's expenditures for academic support, institutional support, instruction, public service, research, and student services;
- (8) "Headcount", the sum of students enrolled for credit during a twelve-month period with each student counted only once during the reporting period, regardless of when the student enrolled;
- (9) "Institution" or "institution of higher education" or "public institution" or "public institution of higher education", any college or university established pursuant to chapter 172, chapter 174, chapter 175, sections 178.631 to 178.640, or sections 178.770 to 178.891;
- (10) "Institutional support", a functional expense category that includes expenses for the day-to-day operational support of the institution, including expenses for general administrative services, operational information technology, central executive-level activities concerned with management and long range planning, legal and fiscal operations, space management, employee personnel and records, logistical services such as purchasing and printing, and public relations and development;
- (11) "Instruction", a functional expense category that includes expenses of the colleges, schools, departments, and other instructional divisions of the institution and expenses for departmental research and public service that are not separately budgeted. "Instruction" shall include general academic instruction. "Instruction" shall not include expenses for academic administration where the primary function is administration or any expenditures associated with workforce development;
- (12) "Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System" or "IPEDS", the system of interrelated educational data surveys reported annually to the National Center for Education Statistics of the United States Department of Education by every institution participating in the federal student financial aid programs;
- 67 (13) "Local revenue", funds received by a community college from 68 its imposition of a tax on property within the community college's

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- 69 taxing district under section 178.800;
- 70 (14) "Master's classified institution", an institution with a 71 Carnegie classification of master's college or university;
- 72 (15) "Operating budget estimate", the dollar amount derived from 73 the calculation model in section 173.1515, containing the calculated operating expenditures and performance funding for which an institution is eligible under section 173.1520, which form the basis for 75the line item operating appropriations for a public institution; 76
- (16) "Other institutional expenditures", expenditures which are not included in core operating expenditures and therefore not directly 78 79 appropriated for through the major line item operating appropriation, including but not limited to scholarships, auxiliary enterprises, 80 hospital services, and independent operations;
 - (17) "Peer comparison group", the public institutions from the peer states that are designated by the same Carnegie classification as a Missouri institution's sector, with the exception of Linn State Technical College, whose peer institutions are chosen nationwide from state supported institutions with similar missions, degree programs, certificates, and credentials offered;
- (18) "Peer states", the group of ten states comprised of the five 88 states next higher than Missouri and the five states next lower than 89 90 Missouri, based on rank-ordering of all states according to Bureau of Economic Analysis based on the 2011 midyear population estimates of 92 the census data for the per capita personal income, updated 93 decennially;
- 94 (19) "Performance funding", that portion of the annual operating budget estimate that is derived from applying the institutional 95 performance measures as approved by the coordinating board for 96 higher education to the percentage of funding designated by the general assembly;
- (20) "Public service", the median of expenditures as reported 100 through IPEDS of those core operating expenditures for activities established primarily to provide noninstructional services beneficial to 101 individuals and groups external to the institution, such as conferences, 102institutes, general advisory service, reference bureaus, and similar 103 104 services provided to particular sectors of the community, including expenses for community services, public broadcasting services, actual 105

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or allocated costs for operation and maintenance of plant and depreciation, and information technology expenses related to the public service activities if the institution separately budgets and expenses information technology resources; otherwise these expenses are included in "academic support";

- (21) "Research", the median of expenditures as reported through 111 112 IPEDS of those core operating expenditures that include separately budgeted-for research distinct from instruction, including expenses for 113 114 activities specifically organized to produce research outcomes and commissioned by an agency either external to the institution or 115 116 separately budgeted by an organizational unit within the 117 institution. The category includes institutes and research centers, individual and project research, and actual or allocated costs for 118 119 operation and maintenance of plant and depreciation. Information 120 technology expenses related to research activities are included if the 121 institution separately budgets and expenses information technology 122 resources; otherwise these expenses are included in "academic support";
 - (22) "Research classified institution", an institution with a Carnegie classification of a research university;
 - (23) "Sector", the designation of a public institution, based on Carnegie classification, as associate's, baccalaureate, master's, or research, with the exception of Linn State Technical College, which is designated in the statewide technical education institution sector;
- 129 (24) "Student services", the median of expenditures as reported 130 through IPEDS of those core operating expenditures for admissions, 131 registrar activities, and activities whose primary purpose is to 132 contribute to students' emotional and physical well-being and to their 133 intellectual, cultural, and social development outside the context of the 134 formal instructional program, including student activities, cultural events, student newspapers, intramural athletics, student 135 136 organizations, supplemental instruction outside the normal 137 administration, student records, and actual or allocated costs for operation and maintenance of plant and depreciation. Information 138 139 technology expenses are included if the institution separately budgets 140 and expenses information technology resources; otherwise these 141 expenses are included in "institutional support";
 - (25) "Weighted student credit hours", the product of an

- institution's number of completed credit hours and the appropriate weight assigned to such credit hours by section 173.1510.
 - 173.1505. 1. The public institutions of higher education shall be categorized into sectors in the following manner:
 - 3 (1) The associate's sector shall include the community colleges 4 and the West Plains campus of Missouri state university;
 - 5 (2) The statewide technical education institution sector shall 6 include Linn State Technical College;
 - 7 (3) The baccalaureate sector shall include Harris-Stowe State 8 University, Missouri Southern State University, and Missouri Western 9 State University;
- 10 (4) The master's sector shall include Lincoln University, Missouri
 11 State University, Northwest Missouri State University, Southeast
 12 Missouri State University, Truman State University, and the University
 13 of Central Missouri; and
- 14 (5) The research sector shall include the University of Missouri.
- 2. If the Carnegie classification of the public institutions change, the sectors identified in subsection 1 of this section shall be updated to reflect the change in Carnegie classification.
 - 173.1510. 1. All courses completed at a public institution of higher education shall be weighted based on their discipline and level.
- 3 2. Disciplines shall be divided into clusters in the following 4 manner:
- 5 (1) Cluster 1 shall include communications, foreign languages, 6 English literature, family and consumer science, industrial arts, 7 mathematics, statistics, parks and recreation and leisure, philosophy, 8 religious studies, psychology, and history;
- 9 (2) Cluster 2 shall include education, physical sciences, visual 10 and performing arts, and business;
- 11 (3) Cluster 3 shall include architecture, computer science, 12 biological science, and public administration;
- 13 (4) Cluster 4 shall include agriculture, library sciences, 14 transportation and materials moving, and health services;
- 15 (5) Cluster 5 shall include engineering and law;
- 16 (6) Cluster 6 shall include medicine, veterinary medicine, and 17 dentistry.
- 18 3. Course levels shall be divided in the following manner:

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          (1) Lower division;
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          (2) Upper division;
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          (3) Master's or specialist;
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          (4) First professional;
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          (5) Doctoral.
          4. Weights for courses in the lower division shall be:
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          (1) Cluster 1, 1.00;
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          (2) Cluster 2, 1.51;
          (3) Cluster 3, 1.84;
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          (4) Cluster 4, 2.19;
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          (5) Cluster 5, 3.34.
          5. Weights for courses in the upper division shall be:
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          (1) Cluster 1, 1.50;
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          (2) Cluster 2, 2.26;
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          (3) Cluster 3, 2.76;
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          (4) Cluster 4, 3.28;
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          (5) Cluster 5, 5.01.
          6. Weights for courses at the master's or specialist level shall be:
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          (1) Cluster 1, 2.10;
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          (2) Cluster 2, 3.17;
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          (3) Cluster 3, 3.86;
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          (4) Cluster 4, 4.60;
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          (5) Cluster 5, 7.01.
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          7. Weights for courses at the first professional level shall be:
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          (1) Cluster 4, 5.48;
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          (2) Cluster 5, 8.35;
          (3) Cluster 6, 10.02.
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          8. Weights for courses at the doctoral level shall be:
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          (1) Cluster 1, 3.00;
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          (2) Cluster 2, 4.53;
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          (3) Cluster 3, 5.52;
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          (4) Cluster 4, 6.57;
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          (5) Cluster 5, 10.02.
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          9. The coordinating board for higher education shall have
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9. The coordinating board for higher education shall have authority to assign weights to courses based on discipline for any discipline that is not addressed by this section. The coordinating board shall assign such weight through the promulgation of an administrative

 - 173.1515. 1. The state share of the operating budget estimate for
 - 2 institutions in the baccalaureate sector, master's sector, research
 - 3 sector, and statewide technical education institution sector shall be
 - 4 calculated as the product of:
- 5 (1) The sum of the institution's totals for academic support and
- 6 institutional support and instruction and public service and research
- 7 and student services; and
- 8 (2) The sector-specific modifier.
- 9 2. The state share of the operating budget estimate for each
- 10 institution in the associate's sector shall be calculated as the difference
- 11 **of**:
- 12 (1) The product of:
- 13 (a) The sum of the institution's totals for academic support and
- 14 institutional support and instruction and public service and research
- 15 and student services; and
- 16 **(b)** The sector-specific modifier;
- 17 (2) Minus fifty percent of the institution's local revenue.
- 3. A modifier shall be calculated specific to each sector, which
- 19 shall be referred to as a "sector specific modifier". The sector specific
- 20 modifier shall be the median of the rank ordered list of institutions in
- 21 a sector peer group using, for each institution, the quotient of:
- 22 (1) Each institution's state appropriation; and
- 23 (2) The sum of academic support and institutional support and
- 24 instruction and public service and research and student services.
- 25 4. Academic support shall be calculated as the product of:
- 26 (1) The sum of instruction and public service and research; and
- 27 (2) An institution's sector peers' median percentage for academic
- 28 support expenditures relative to the sum of an institution's
- 29 expenditures for instruction and public service and research.
- 30 5. Institutional support shall be calculated as the product of:
- 31 (1) The sum of academic support and instruction and public
- 32 service and research and student services; and

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- 33 (2) The sector peers' median percentage for institutional support 34 expenditures relative to expenditures in academic support, instruction, 35 public service, research, and student services.
- 6. An institution's cost of instruction shall be calculated as the product of:
- 38 (1) The standardized rate per credit hour for the sector in which 39 the institution is classified; and
 - (2) Weighted student credit hours; and
- 41 (3) The institution's Pell weight, if any.
- 7. Each institution shall have a Pell weight calculated for it. An institution's Pell weight shall be calculated as the sum of one and the institution's value over the Pell threshold. The Pell threshold for a sector shall be the median value of the sector's peer comparison group's rank ordered list of institutions' percentage of students receiving a Pell grant. An institution's percentage of students receiving a Pell grant shall be the quotient of the institution's undergraduate headcount and the number of students at that institution receiving a Pell grant.
- 8. Public service shall be calculated as the product of:
- 51 (1) The median of the institution's sector peers' public service 52 expenditures by headcount; and
 - (2) The institution's headcount.
 - 9. Research shall be calculated as the product of:
- 55 (1) The sponsored research expenditures incurred by the 56 institution in the prior fiscal year; and
 - (2) Twenty-five-hundredths.
- 10. A standardized rate per credit hour shall be calculated for each sector. The standardized rate per credit hour shall be the median value of each peer comparison group's rank ordered list of rates per credit hour using the quotient of:
 - (1) Each peer institution's instruction expenditure; and
- 63 (2) The number of each institution's unweighted student credit 64 hours.
 - 11. Student services shall be calculated as the product of:
- 66 (1) The median of student services expenditures by headcount 67 for an institution's sector peers; and
- 68 (2) The institution's headcount.
 - 173.1520. 1. When the general assembly appropriates funds for

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2 public institutions of higher education during the appropriations process, ten percent of each institution's funding shall be earmarked and designated as performance funding and shall be identified as a separate line item under that institution in the higher education appropriations bill. 6

- 2. Performance funds shall be directed into the "Higher **Education Performance Fund".**
- 9 3. The coordinating board for higher education shall adopt institutional performance measures in collaboration with the institutions. The coordinating board shall update and revise the 12 institutional performance measures every five years beginning in 2017.
 - 4. To receive performance funding, an institution shall satisfy the institutional performance measures adopted by the coordinating board for higher education. The amount of performance funding earned by an institution shall be in proportion to the number of institutional performance measures it meets.
- 18 5. Each institution shall provide proof to the coordinating board for higher education that it has satisfied the institutional performance 19 measures. If an institution proves that it has satisfied one or more of 20 21the institutional performance measures, the coordinating board for 22 higher education shall authorize the release of the appropriate amount of funds. 23
- 24 6. There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Higher 25 Education Performance Fund", which shall consist of money collected 26 under this section. The coordinating board for higher education shall 27administer the fund. The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the state treasurer may 2829 approve disbursements. The fund shall be a dedicated fund and, upon 30 appropriation, money in the fund shall be used solely for the administration of this section. Any moneys remaining in the fund at 31 the end of the biennium shall revert to the credit of the general 3233 revenue fund. The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in the same manner as other funds are invested. Any interest and moneys 34earned on such investments shall be credited to the fund. 35
- 36 7. The coordinating board for higher education shall promulgate 37 rules and regulations to implement the provisions of sections 173.1500 to 173.1535. 38

39 8. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010 that is created under the authority delegated in this section 40 shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536, and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the powers 43 vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536, to review, to 44 delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are 45subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking 46 47 authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2013, shall be invalid and void. 48

173.1525. 1. No operating appropriation for fiscal year 2015 for any public institution of higher education calculated under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535 shall result in less than ninety-eight percent of the amount appropriated for the institution in fiscal year 2014, excluding any separate line items from the fiscal year 2014 appropriation.

2. No operating appropriation for any public institution of higher education calculated under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535 for fiscal year 2016 and subsequent fiscal years shall result in less than ninety-eight percent of the previous fiscal year's amount appropriated under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535 until such time as the operating appropriation is equal to ninety-eight percent of the previous fiscal year's amount appropriated under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535.

173.1530. Unless otherwise specified, calculations used for the higher education funding model under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535 shall use a three year rolling average of final data obtained through IPEDS, except for fiscal year 2015, for which an average of the final data for fiscal years 2010 and 2011 shall be used.

173.1535. 1. The joint committee on education shall review the functionality of the higher education funding model established under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535 every five years beginning in academic year 2018-2019. When conducting its review, the joint committee shall consult with the coordinating board for higher education, the department of higher education, at least two academic researchers, the Midwest Higher Education Compact, and the Education Commission of the States, and may consult with any education foundation that regularly conducts research in the area of state funding for higher education.

2. The joint committee shall submit a written report, with any recommendations for legislative action or action by the coordinating board for higher education, the department of higher education, or the institutions, to the secretary of the senate, the chief clerk of the house of representatives, and the coordinating board for higher education.

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
