AN ACT

To repeal sections 163.191 and 173.616, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof thirteen new sections relating to higher education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 163.191 and 173.616, RSMo, are repealed and thirteen
new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 163.191, 173.616,
173.1500, 173.1505, 173.1510, 173.1515, 173.1520, 173.1525, 173.1527, 173.1529,
173.1530, 173.1532, and 173.1535, to read as follows:

163.191. 1. Each year public community colleges in the aggregate shall $\mathbf{2}$ be eligible to receive from state funds, if state funds are available and 3 appropriated, an amount [up to but not more than fifty percent] of the state 4 community colleges' planned operating costs as determined by the [department 5 of higher education funding model under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535. As 6 used in this subsection, the term "year" means from July first to June thirtieth 7 of the following year. As used in this subsection, the term "operating costs" 8 means all costs attributable to current operations, including all direct costs of instruction, instructors' and counselors' compensation, administrative costs, all 9 normal operating costs and all similar noncapital expenditures during any year, 10 excluding costs of construction of facilities and the purchase of equipment, 11 12 furniture, and other capital items authorized and funded in accordance with

subsection 2 of this section. Operating costs shall be computed in accordance 13 with accounting methods and procedures to be specified by the department of 1415higher education. The department of higher education shall review all institutional budget requests and prepare appropriation recommendations 16annually for the community colleges under the supervision of the 17department. The department's budget request shall include a recommended level 18 19 of funding. Distribution of appropriated funds to community college districts 20shall be in accordance with the [community college resource allocation 21model. This model shall be developed and revised as appropriate cooperatively by the community colleges and the department of higher education. The 2223department of higher education shall recommend the model to the coordinating 24board for higher education for their approval. The core funding level for each 25community college shall initially be established at an amount agreed upon by the 26community colleges and the department of higher education. This amount will 27be adjusted annually for inflation, limited growth, and program improvements in accordance with the resource allocation model starting with fiscal year 1993] 2829higher education funding model established in sections 173.1500 to 173.1535, using the calculation in subsection 1 of section 173.1515, with 30 each community college's appropriation calculated separately. The 3132 department of higher education shall request new and separate state aid funds for any new districts for their first six years of operation. The request for the 33 new districts shall be based upon the same level of funding being provided to the 3435existing districts, and should be sufficient to provide for the growth required to 36 reach a mature enrollment level. [The department of higher education will be 37 responsible for evaluating the effectiveness of the resource allocation model and 38 will submit a report to the speaker of the house of representatives and president pro tem of the senate by November 1997, and every four years thereafter.] 39

40 2. In addition to state funds received for operating purposes, each community college district shall be eligible to receive an annual appropriation, 41 42exclusive of any capital appropriations, for the cost of maintenance and repair of facilities and grounds, including surface parking areas, and purchases of 4344equipment and furniture. Such funds shall not exceed in any year an amount equal to ten percent of the state appropriations, exclusive of any capital 4546 appropriations, to community college districts for operating purposes during the 47most recently completed fiscal year. The department of higher education may include in its annual appropriations request the necessary funds to implement 48

49the provisions of this subsection and when appropriated shall distribute the funds to each community college district as appropriated. The department of higher 50education appropriations request shall be for specific maintenance, repair, and 5152equipment projects at specific community college districts, shall be in an amount 53of fifty percent of the cost of a given project as determined by the coordinating board and shall be only for projects which have been approved by the coordinating 54board through a process of application, evaluation, and approval as established 55by the coordinating board. The coordinating board, as part of its process of 56 application, evaluation, and approval, shall require the community college district 57to provide proof that the fifty-percent share of funding to be defrayed by the 5859district is either on hand or committed for maintenance, repair, and equipment 60 projects. Only salaries or portions of salaries paid which are directly related to 61 approved projects may be used as a part of the fifty-percent share of funding.

3. School districts offering two-year college courses pursuant to section
178.370 on October 31, 1961, shall receive state aid pursuant to subsections 1 and
2 of this section if all scholastic standards established pursuant to sections
178.770 to 178.890 are met.

66 4. In order to make postsecondary educational opportunities available to 67 Missouri residents who do not reside in an existing community college district, community colleges organized pursuant to section 178.370 or sections 178.770 to 68 69 178.890 shall be authorized pursuant to the funding provisions of this section to offer courses and programs outside the community college district with prior 70approval by the coordinating board for higher education. The classes conducted 7172outside the district shall be self-sustaining except that the coordinating board shall promulgate rules to reimburse selected out-of-district instruction only where 73 prior need has been established in geographical areas designated by the 74coordinating board for higher education. Funding for such off-campus instruction 75shall be included in the appropriation recommendations, shall be determined by 76the general assembly and shall continue, within the amounts appropriated 77 therefor, unless the general assembly disapproves the action by concurrent 78resolution. 79

5. A "community college" is an institution of higher education deriving financial resources from local, state, and federal sources, and providing postsecondary education primarily for persons above the twelfth grade age level, including courses in:

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(1) Liberal arts and sciences, including general education;

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85 (2) Occupational, vocational-technical; and

86 (3) A variety of educational community services.

87 Community college course offerings lead to the granting of certificates, diplomas,88 and/or associate degrees, but do not include baccalaureate or higher degrees.

6. When distributing state aid authorized for community colleges, the state treasurer may, in any year if requested by a community college, disregard the provision in section 30.180 requiring the state treasurer to convert the warrant requesting payment into a check or draft and wire transfer the amount to be distributed to the community college directly to the community college's designated deposit for credit to the community college's account.

173.616. 1. The following schools, training programs, and courses of 2 instruction shall be exempt from the provisions of sections 173.600 to 173.618:

3 (1) A public institution;

4 (2) Any college or university represented directly or indirectly on the 5 advisory committee of the coordinating board for higher education as provided in 6 subsection 3 of section 173.005;

7 (3) An institution that is certified by the board as an "approved private
8 institution" under subdivision (2) of section 173.1102;

9 (4) A not-for-profit religious school that is accredited by the American 10 Association of Bible Colleges, the Association of Theological Schools in the United 11 States and Canada, or a regional accrediting association, such as the North 12 Central Association, which is recognized by the Council on Postsecondary 13 Accreditation and the United States Department of Education; and

(5) Beginning July 1, 2008, all out-of-state public institutions of higher
education, as such term is defined in subdivision (12) of subsection 2 of section
173.005.

17 2. The coordinating board shall exempt the following schools, training
18 programs and courses of instruction from the provisions of sections 173.600 to
19 173.618:

(1) A not-for-profit school owned, controlled and operated by a bona fide
religious or denominational organization which offers no programs or degrees and
grants no degrees or certificates other than those specifically designated as
theological, bible, divinity or other religious designation;

(2) A not-for-profit school owned, controlled and operated by a bona fide
eleemosynary organization which provides instruction with no financial charge
to its students and at which no part of the instructional cost is defrayed by or

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through programs of governmental student financial aid, including grants andloans, provided directly to or for individual students;

(3) A school which offers instruction only in subject areas which are
primarily for avocational or recreational purposes as distinct from courses to
teach employable, marketable knowledge or skills, which does not advertise
occupational objectives and which does not grant degrees;

33 (4) A course of instruction, study or training program sponsored by an
34 employer for the training and preparation of its own employees;

35 (5) A course of study or instruction conducted by a trade, business or 36 professional organization with a closed membership where participation in the 37 course is limited to bona fide members of the trade, business or professional 38 organization, or a course of instruction for persons in preparation for an 39 examination given by a state board or commission where the state board or 40 commission approves that course and school;

41 (6) A school or person whose clientele are primarily students aged sixteen42 or under.

3. A school which is otherwise licensed and approved under and pursuant
to any other licensing law of this state shall be exempt from sections 173.600 to
173.618, but a state certificate of incorporation shall not constitute licensing for
the purpose of sections 173.600 to 173.618.

474. Any school, training program or course of instruction exempted herein may elect by majority action of its governing body or by action of its director to 48 apply for approval of the school, training program or course of instruction under 49 the provisions of sections 173.600 to 173.618. Notwithstanding the 50provisions of subsections 1 and 2 of section 173.606 to the contrary, any 5152approval granted under this section to an otherwise exempt school, training program, or course of instruction shall expire at the end of 53five years. Upon application to and approval by the coordinating board, such 54school training program or course of instruction may become exempt from the 5556provisions of sections 173.600 to 173.618 at any subsequent time, except the board shall not approve an application for exemption if the approved school is 57then in any status of noncompliance with certification standards and a reversion 58to exempt status shall not relieve the school of any liability for indemnification 5960 or any penalty for noncompliance with certification standards during the period 61 of the school's approved status.

173.1500. As used in sections 173.1500 to 173.1535, unless the

2 context requires otherwise, the following terms shall mean:

3 (1) "Associate's institution", an institution with a Carnegie
4 classification of associate's;

5 (2) "Baccalaureate institution", an institution with a Carnegie
6 classification of baccalaureate college;

7 (3) "Carnegie classification", an institutional classification coding
8 structure developed by the Andrew W. Carnegie Foundation for the
9 advancement of teaching, including updates made in 2010;

(4) "Core operating expenditures", total expenditures for the
essential education activities of the institution, which shall include the
institution's expenditures for academic support, institutional support,
instruction, public service, research, and student services;

(5) "Headcount", the sum of students enrolled for credit during
a twelve-month period with each student counted only once during the
reporting period, regardless of when the student enrolled;

(6) "Institution" or "institution of higher education" or "public
institution" or "public institution of higher education", any college or
university established pursuant to chapter 172, chapter 174, chapter
175, sections 178.631 to 178.640, or sections 178.770 to 178.891;

(7) "Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System" or
"IPEDS", the system of interrelated educational data surveys reported
annually to the National Center for Education Statistics of the United
States Department of Education by every institution participating in
the federal student financial aid programs;

26 (8) "Master's classified institution", an institution with a Carnegie
27 classification of master's college or university;

(9) "Operating budget estimate", the dollar amount derived from
the calculation model in section 173.1515, containing the calculated
operating expenditures and performance funding for which an
institution is eligible under section 173.1520, which form the basis for
the line item operating appropriations for a public institution;

(10) "Other institutional expenditures", expenditures which are
not included in core operating expenditures and therefore not directly
appropriated for through the major line item operating appropriation,
including but not limited to scholarships, auxiliary enterprises,
hospital services, and independent operations;

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(11) "Peer comparison group", the public institutions from the

peer states that are designated by the same Carnegie classification as
a Missouri institution's sector, with the exceptions of Linn State
Technical College and Truman State University;

(12) "Peer states", the group of ten states comprised of the five 42states next higher than Missouri and the five states next lower than 43Missouri, based on rank-ordering of all states according to the Bureau 44 of Economic Analysis based on the 2011 midyear population estimates 45of the census data for the per capita personal income, except for 46 institutions categorized in the statewide liberal arts and sciences 47institution sector, for which peer states shall be selected as provided 48 in subsection 4 of section 173.1505. The rank-ordering of all states 49 according to the Bureau of Economic Analysis using midyear 50population estimates of the census data for the per capita personal 51 income shall be recalculated decennially based on the previous census; 52(13) "Pell threshold", the median value of the sector's peer 53

54 comparison group's rank ordered list of institutions' percentage of 55 students receiving a Pell grant;

(14) "Pell weight", the sum of one and the institution's value over
the Pell threshold;

58 (15) "Performance funding", that portion of the annual operating 59 budget estimate that is derived from applying the institutional 60 performance measures as approved by the coordinating board for 61 higher education to the percentage of funding designated by the 62 general assembly;

63 (16) "Research classified institution", an institution with a
64 Carnegie classification of a research university;

65 (17) "Sector", the designation of a public institution, based on 66 Carnegie classification, as associate's, baccalaureate, master's, or 67 research, with the exceptions of:

(a) Linn State Technical College, which is designated in the
statewide technical education institution sector; and

70 (b) Truman State University, which is designated in the 71 statewide liberal arts and sciences institution sector;

(18) "Sector specific modifier", the median of the rank ordered
list of institutions in a sector peer comparison group using, for each
institution, the quotient of:

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(a) Each institution's state appropriation; and

76 (b) The sum of academic support and institutional support and 77 instruction and public service and research and student services;

(19) "Standardized rate per credit hour", the median value of
each peer comparison group's rank ordered list of rates per credit hour
using the quotient of:

81 (a) Each peer institution's instruction expenditure; and

82 (b) The number of each institution's unweighted student credit83 hours;

84 (20) "Target funding level", the state share of the operating 85 budget estimate for institutions;

86 (21) "Weighted student credit hours", the product of an 87 institution's number of completed credit hours and the appropriate 88 weight assigned to such credit hours by section 173.1510.

173.1505. 1. The public institutions of higher education shall be 2 categorized into sectors in the following manner:

3 (1) The associate's sector shall include the community colleges
4 and the West Plains campus of Missouri State University;

5 (2) The statewide technical education institution sector shall
6 include Linn State Technical College;

7 (3) The baccalaureate sector shall include Harris-Stowe State
8 University, Missouri Southern State University, and Missouri Western
9 State University;

10 (4) The master's sector shall include Lincoln University, Missouri
11 State University, Northwest Missouri State University, Southeast
12 Missouri State University, and the University of Central Missouri;

13 (5) The statewide liberal arts and sciences institution sector
14 shall include Truman State University; and

15 (6) The research sector shall include the University of Missouri.

If the Carnegie classification of the public institutions change,
 the sectors identified in subsection 1 of this section shall be updated to
 reflect the change in Carnegie classification.

The peer comparison group for Linn State Technical College
 shall consist of peer institutions chosen by the coordinating board for
 higher education nationwide from state supported institutions with
 similar missions, degree programs, certificates, and credentials offered.
 4. The peer comparison group for Truman State University shall
 consist of institutions with similar missions, degree programs, and a

25similar level of selectivity in admissions requirements, chosen by the coordinating board for higher education from the group of thirty states 2627 comprised of the fifteen states next higher than Missouri and the 28 fifteen states next lower than Missouri, based on rank-ordering of all 29 states according to the Bureau of Economic Analysis based on the 2011 30 midyear population estimates of the census data for the per capita 31 personal income, or an equal number of states above and below 32 Missouri in order to obtain a minimum of ten institutions in the 33 statewide liberal arts and sciences institution sector peer comparison 34 group. The rank-ordering of all states according to the Bureau of **35** Economic Analysis using midyear population estimates of the census data for the per capita personal income shall be recalculated 36 decennially based on the previous census. 37

173.1510. 1. All courses completed at a public institution of 2 higher education shall be weighted based on their discipline and level.

173.1515. 1. The state share of the operating budget estimate for2 each institution shall be calculated as the product of:

3 (1) The sum of the institution's totals for academic support and

- (1) The median of the institution's sector peers' public serviceexpenditures by headcount; and
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(2) The institution's headcount.

- 27 6. Research shall be calculated as the product of:
- 28 (1) The sponsored research expenditures incurred by the 29 institution in the prior fiscal year; and
- 30 (2) Twenty-five-hundredths.
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- 7. Student services shall be calculated as the product of:
- 32 (1) The median of student services expenditures by headcount
 33 for an institution's sector peers; and
- 34

(2) The institution's headcount.

173.1520. 1. When the general assembly appropriates funds for public institutions of higher education during the appropriations process, ten percent of each institution's funding shall be earmarked and designated as performance funding and shall be identified as a separate line item under that institution in the higher education appropriations bill.

2. Performance funds shall be directed into the "Higher
8 Education Performance Fund".

9 3. The coordinating board for higher education shall develop and 10 adopt institutional performance measures for each institution, in 11 collaboration with the institutions, by July 1, 2014, that shall be used 12 for purposes of this section. Five institutional performance measures 13 shall be adopted for each institution. The coordinating board shall 14 update and revise the institutional performance measures every five 15 years beginning in academic year 2019-2020.

4. Annually, for an institution to receive the portion of its funding that has been earmarked and designated as performance funding, it shall satisfy the institutional performance measures adopted by the coordinating board for higher education. If an institution satisfies all of its institutional performance measures, the coordinating board for higher education shall authorize the release of the full amount of the institution's funding that has been earmarked and designated as performance funding. If an institution satisfies at least one, but not all, of its institutional performance measures, the coordinating board for higher education shall authorize the release of an amount of funds equal to the product of:

(1) The quotient of the number of institutional performancemeasures satisfied by the institution and five; and

29 (2) The amount of the institution's funds earmarked and 30 designated as performance funding.

5. There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Higher 3132Education Performance Fund", which shall consist of money collected under this section. The coordinating board for higher education shall 33 administer the fund. The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. 34 In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the state treasurer may 35approve disbursements. The fund shall be a dedicated fund and, upon 36 37appropriation, money in the fund shall be used solely for the administration of this section. Any moneys remaining in the fund at 38 the end of the biennium shall revert to the credit of the general 39 revenue fund. The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in 40 the same manner as other funds are invested. Any interest and moneys 41 42earned on such investments shall be credited to the fund.

6. The coordinating board for higher education shall promulgate
rules and regulations to implement the provisions of sections 173.1500
to 173.1535.

46 7. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 47536.010 that is created under the authority delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of 48 the provisions of chapter 536, and, if applicable, section 536.028. This 49 section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the powers 50vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536, to review, to 51delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are 52subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking 53authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2013, shall 54be invalid and void. 55

173.1525. 1. When the total amount of funds appropriated to the 2 public institutions in a fiscal year exceeds or is equal to the total 3 amount of funds appropriated to the public institutions in the prior 4 fiscal year:

5 (1) No operating appropriation for fiscal year 2015 for any public 6 institution of higher education calculated under sections 173.1500 to 7 173.1515 shall result in less than ninety-eight percent of the amount 8 appropriated for the institution in fiscal year 2014, excluding any 9 separate line items from the fiscal year 2014 appropriation, except as 10 provided in subsection 2 of this section; and

11 (2) No operating appropriation for any public institution of 12 higher education calculated under sections 173.1500 to 173.1515 for 13 fiscal year 2016 and subsequent fiscal years shall result in less than 14 ninety-eight percent of the previous fiscal year's amount appropriated 15 under sections 173.1500 to 173.1515 until such time as the operating 16 appropriation is equal to the institution's target funding level as 17 calculated under sections 173.1500 to 173.1515, except as provided in 18 subsection 2 of this section.

2. From the appropriation calculated under subsection 1 of this
 section, ten percent of the funds shall be earmarked and designated as
 performance funding and shall be subject to the provisions of section
 173.1520.

173.1527. When the total amount of funds appropriated to the public institutions in a fiscal year exceeds or is equal to the total amount of funds appropriated to the public institutions in the prior fiscal year, each institution shall receive an appropriation equal to the sum of:

6 (1) The product of:

7 (a) The institution's proportionate share of the difference 8 between:

9 a. The total of the target funding levels for all public 10 institutions; and

11 b. The current fiscal year appropriation for all public 12 institutions; and

(b) The increase in the total amount of funds appropriated to all
public institutions from the previous year to the current fiscal year;
and

(2) The amount of the appropriation that the institution received
in the previous fiscal year, provided the institution is not subject to the
provisions of section 173.1525.

173.1529. If the total amount of funds appropriated to the public institutions is less than the total amount of funds appropriated to the public institutions in the prior fiscal year, an institution shall receive a percentage of the total amount of funds appropriated equal to the percentage of the total amount of funds the institution received under sections 173.1500 to 173.1515 during the prior fiscal year.

173.1530. 1. Figures for academic support, institutional support,
2 instruction, public service, research, and student services shall be
3 obtained from data reported to IPEDS.

2. Unless otherwise specified, calculations used for the higher education funding model under sections 173.1500 to 173.1535 shall use a three-year rolling average of final data obtained through IPEDS, except for fiscal year 2015, for which an average of the final data for fiscal years 2010 and 2011 shall be used.

9 3. If additional definitions are required when implementing or
10 administering the higher education funding model, definitions from
11 IPEDS may be used as needed.

173.1532. 1. When the general assembly appropriates funds forpublic institutions of higher education

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4 during the appropriations process, ten percent of each institution's 5 funding shall be earmarked and designated as career placement 6 incentive funding. An institution shall only receive such funding if it 7 satisfies the career placement rates established by the department of 8 higher education pursuant to this section.

9 2. By July 1, 2014, the department of higher education shall 10 develop and adopt a methodology and system that the public 11 institutions shall use for tracking and verifying the career placement 12 rates for their graduates.

13 **3.** The department's methodology shall also:

(1) Track and verify acceptance rates at graduate schools,
professional schools, or for institutions in the associate's sector or the
statewide technical education institution sector, acceptance rates at a
public or private four-year institution; and

18 (2) Identify such acceptance rates in a manner that does not
19 negatively impact an institution's career placement rate.

20 4. The department shall establish benchmarks and parameters

21 against which the public institutions shall be measured.

5. The department's methodology shall consider the different conditions and circumstances of the sectors in which the public institutions are categorized.

6. The department of higher education shall promulgate such methodology, benchmarks, and parameters through rules and regulations. The department shall update and revise its methodology, benchmarks, and parameters as necessary.

7. The coordinating board for higher education and the
institutions shall implement the methodology developed pursuant to
this section when measuring institutional performance under section
173.1520.

173.1535. 1. The joint committee on education shall review the functionality of the higher education funding model established under $\mathbf{2}$ sections 173.1500 to 173.1535 every five years beginning in academic 3 year 2018-2019. When conducting its review, the joint committee shall 4 consult with the coordinating board for higher education, the $\mathbf{5}$ department of higher education, at least two academic researchers, the 6 Midwest Higher Education Compact, and the Education Commission of 7 the States, and may consult with any education foundation that 8 regularly conducts research in the area of state funding for higher 9 10 education.

2. The joint committee shall submit a written report, with any recommendations for legislative action or action by the coordinating board for higher education, the department of higher education, or the institutions, to the secretary of the senate, the chief clerk of the house of representatives, and the coordinating board for higher education.
