Amend SS/Senate Bill No. 519, Page 1, Section A, Line 3

2 of said page, by inserting after all of said line the following:

3 "170.015. 1. Any course materials and instruction relating  
4 to human sexuality and sexually transmitted diseases shall be  
5 medically and factually accurate, be based on peer reviewed  
6 projects that have been demonstrated to influence healthy  
7 behavior, be age appropriate, and shall:

8 (1) Present abstinence from sexual activity as the  
9 preferred choice of behavior in relation to all sexual activity  
10 [for unmarried pupils because it is the only method that is one  
11 hundred percent effective in preventing pregnancy, sexually  
12 transmitted diseases and the emotional trauma associated with  
13 adolescent sexual activity, and advise students that teenage  
14 sexual activity places them at a higher risk of dropping out of  
15 school because of the consequences of sexually transmitted  
16 diseases and unplanned pregnancy] as the only sure way to avoid  
17 pregnancy or sexually transmitted infection;

18 (2) Stress that sexually transmitted [diseases] infections  
19 are serious, possible, health hazards of sexual activity. Pupils  
20 shall be provided with the latest medical information regarding  
21 exposure to human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), acquired immune

1 deficiency syndrome (AIDS), human papilloma virus, hepatitis and  
2 other sexually transmitted [diseases] infections;

3 (3) Present students with the latest medically factual  
4 information [regarding both the possible side effects and health  
5 benefits of all forms of contraception, including the success and  
6 failure rates for the prevention of pregnancy and sexually  
7 transmitted diseases; or shall present students with information  
8 on contraceptives and pregnancy in a manner consistent with the  
9 provisions of the federal abstinence education law, 42 U.S.C.  
10 Section 710] about the health benefits and side effects of all  
11 contraceptives and barrier methods as a means to prevent  
12 pregnancy and to reduce the risk of contracting sexually  
13 transmitted infections, HIV/AIDS and other diseases;

14 (4) [Include a discussion of the possible emotional and  
15 psychological consequences of preadolescent and adolescent sexual  
16 activity and the consequences of adolescent pregnancy, as well as  
17 the advantages of adoption, including the adoption of special  
18 needs children, and the processes involved in making an adoption  
19 plan] Provide information about the vaccine for human papilloma  
20 virus, which may prevent cervical cancer, genital warts,  
21 infertility, and other reproductive health problems, when  
22 administered prior to becoming sexually active;

23 (5) Encourage family communication between parents and  
24 children about sexuality;

25 (6) Help young people gain knowledge about the physical,  
26 biological, and hormonal changes of adolescence and subsequent  
27 states of human maturation and the skills to make responsible  
28 decisions about sexuality, including how alcohol and drug use can  
29 affect that decision making;

1            [(5)] (7) Teach skills of conflict management, personal  
2 responsibility and positive self-esteem through discussion and  
3 role-playing at appropriate grade levels to emphasize that the  
4 pupil has the power to control personal behavior. Pupils shall  
5 be encouraged to base their actions on reasoning, self-  
6 discipline, sense of responsibility, self-control, and ethical  
7 considerations, such as respect for one's self and others. Pupils  
8 shall be taught not to make unwanted physical and verbal sexual  
9 advances or otherwise exploit another person. Pupils shall be  
10 taught to resist unwanted sexual advances and other negative peer  
11 pressure;

12            [(6)] (8) Advise pupils of the laws pertaining to their  
13 financial responsibility to children born in and out of wedlock  
14 and advise pupils of the provisions of chapter 566 pertaining to  
15 statutory rape;

16            (9) Help pupils develop skills in critical thinking,  
17 problem solving, decision making, and stress management in order  
18 to make healthy decisions about sexuality and relationships;

19            (10) Teach pupils about the dangers of sexual predators,  
20 including online predators when using electronic communication  
21 methods such as the internet, cell phones, text messages, chat  
22 rooms, email, and instant messaging programs. Pupils shall be  
23 taught how to behave responsibly and remain safe on the internet  
24 and the importance of having open communication with responsible  
25 adults and reporting any inappropriate situation, activity, or  
26 abuse to a responsible adult, and depending on intent and  
27 content, to local law enforcement, the FBI, or the CyberTipLine;

28            (11) Teach pupils about the consequences, both personal and  
29 legal, of inappropriate text messaging even among friends.

1           2. Policies concerning referrals and parental notification  
2 regarding contraception shall be determined by local school  
3 boards or charter schools, consistent with the provisions of  
4 section 167.611.

5           3. A school district or charter school which provides human  
6 sexuality instruction may separate students according to gender  
7 for instructional purposes.

8           4. The board of a school district or charter school shall  
9 determine the specific content of the district's or school's  
10 instruction in human sexuality, in accordance with subsections 1  
11 to 3 of this section, and shall ensure that all instruction in  
12 human sexuality is appropriate to the age of the students  
13 receiving such instruction.

14           5. A school district or charter school shall notify the  
15 parent or legal guardian of each student enrolled in the district  
16 or school of:

17           (1) The basic content of the district's or school's human  
18 sexuality instruction to be provided to the student; and

19           (2) The parent's right to remove the student from any part  
20 of the district's or school's human sexuality instruction.

21           6. A school district or charter school shall make all  
22 curriculum materials and names and affiliations of presenters  
23 used in the district's or school's human sexuality instruction  
24 available for public inspection pursuant to chapter 610 prior to  
25 the use of such materials in actual instruction.

26           [7. No school district or charter school, or its personnel  
27 or agents, shall provide abortion services, or permit a person or  
28 entity to offer, sponsor, or furnish in any manner any course  
29 materials or instruction relating to human sexuality or sexually

1 transmitted diseases to its students if such person or entity is  
2 a provider of abortion services.

3 8. As used in this section, the following terms mean:

4 (1) "Abortion", the same meaning as such term is defined in  
5 section 188.015;

6 (2) "Abortion services":

7 (a) Performing, inducing, or assisting in the performance  
8 or inducing of an abortion which is not necessary to save the  
9 life of the mother;

10 (b) Encouraging a patient to have an abortion or referring  
11 a patient for an abortion, which is not necessary to save the  
12 life of the mother; or

13 (c) Developing or dispensing drugs, chemicals, or devices  
14 intended to be used to induce an abortion which is not necessary  
15 to save the life of the mother.]" ; and

16 Further amend the title and enacting clause accordingly.
