Amend Senate Bill No. 802, Page 1, Section title, Line 3,

2 of the title, by striking "a ban on abortions for Down Syndrome"
 3 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "family planning";
 4 and

5 Further amend said bill, Page 1, Section A, Line 3, by
 6 inserting after all of said line the following:

7 "170.015. 1. Any course materials and instruction relating
 8 to human sexuality and sexually transmitted diseases shall be
 9 medically and factually accurate, be based on peer reviewed
 10 projects that have been demonstrated to influence healthy
 11 behavior, be age appropriate, and shall:

12 (1) Present abstinence from sexual activity as the
 13 preferred choice of behavior in relation to all sexual activity
 14 [for unmarried pupils because it is the only method that is one
 15 hundred percent effective in preventing pregnancy, sexually
 16 transmitted diseases and the emotional trauma associated with
 17 adolescent sexual activity, and advise students that teenage
 18 sexual activity places them at a higher risk of dropping out of
 19 school because of the consequences of sexually transmitted
 20 diseases and unplanned pregnancy] as the only sure way to avoid
 21 pregnancy or sexually transmitted infection;

1 (2) Stress that sexually transmitted [diseases] infections
2 are serious, possible, health hazards of sexual activity. Pupils
3 shall be provided with the latest medical information regarding
4 exposure to human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), acquired immune
5 deficiency syndrome (AIDS), human papilloma virus, hepatitis and
6 other sexually transmitted [diseases] infections;

7 (3) Present students with the latest medically factual
8 information [regarding both the possible side effects and health
9 benefits of all forms of contraception, including the success and
10 failure rates for the prevention of pregnancy and sexually
11 transmitted diseases; or shall present students with information
12 on contraceptives and pregnancy in a manner consistent with the
13 provisions of the federal abstinence education law, 42 U.S.C.
14 Section 710] about the health benefits and side effects of all
15 contraceptives and barrier methods as a means to prevent
16 pregnancy and to reduce the risk of contracting sexually
17 transmitted infections, HIV/AIDS and other diseases;

18 (4) [Include a discussion of the possible emotional and
19 psychological consequences of preadolescent and adolescent sexual
20 activity and the consequences of adolescent pregnancy, as well as
21 the advantages of adoption, including the adoption of special
22 needs children, and the processes involved in making an adoption
23 plan] Provide information about the vaccine for human papilloma
24 virus, which may prevent cervical cancer, genital warts,
25 infertility, and other reproductive health problems, when
26 administered prior to becoming sexually active;

27 (5) Encourage family communication between parents and
28 children about sexuality;

29 (6) Help young people gain knowledge about the physical,

1 biological, and hormonal changes of adolescence and subsequent
2 states of human maturation and the skills to make responsible
3 decisions about sexuality, including how alcohol and drug use can
4 affect that decision making;

5 [(5)] (7) Teach skills of conflict management, personal
6 responsibility and positive self-esteem through discussion and
7 role-playing at appropriate grade levels to emphasize that the
8 pupil has the power to control personal behavior. Pupils shall
9 be encouraged to base their actions on reasoning,
10 self-discipline, sense of responsibility, self-control, and
11 ethical considerations, such as respect for one's self and
12 others. Pupils shall be taught not to make unwanted physical and
13 verbal sexual advances or otherwise exploit another person.
14 Pupils shall be taught to resist unwanted sexual advances and
15 other negative peer pressure;

16 [(6)] (8) Advise pupils of the laws pertaining to their
17 financial responsibility to children born in and out of wedlock
18 and advise pupils of the provisions of chapter 566 pertaining to
19 statutory rape;

20 (9) Help pupils develop skills in critical thinking,
21 problem solving, decision making, and stress management in order
22 to make healthy decisions about sexuality and relationships;

23 [(7)] (10) Teach pupils about the dangers of sexual
24 predators, including online predators when using electronic
25 communication methods such as the internet, cell phones, text
26 messages, chat rooms, email, and instant messaging programs.
27 Pupils shall be taught how to behave responsibly and remain safe
28 on the internet and the importance of having open communication
29 with responsible adults and reporting any inappropriate

1 situation, activity, or abuse to a responsible adult, and
2 depending on intent and content, to local law enforcement, the
3 Federal Bureau of Investigation, or the National Center for
4 Missing & Exploited Children's CyberTipline; and

5 [(8)] (11) Teach pupils about the consequences, both
6 personal and legal, of inappropriate text messaging, even among
7 friends.

8 2. Policies concerning referrals and parental notification
9 regarding contraception shall be determined by local school
10 boards or charter schools, consistent with the provisions of
11 section 167.611.

12 3. A school district or charter school which provides human
13 sexuality instruction may separate students according to gender
14 for instructional purposes.

15 4. The board of a school district or charter school shall
16 determine the specific content of the district's or school's
17 instruction in human sexuality, in accordance with subsections 1
18 to 3 of this section, and shall ensure that all instruction in
19 human sexuality is appropriate to the age of the students
20 receiving such instruction.

21 5. A school district or charter school shall notify the
22 parent or legal guardian of each student enrolled in the district
23 or school of:

24 (1) The basic content of the district's or school's human
25 sexuality instruction to be provided to the student; and

26 (2) The parent's right to remove the student from any part
27 of the district's or school's human sexuality instruction.

28 6. A school district or charter school shall make all
29 curriculum materials and names and affiliations of presenters

1 used in the district's or school's human sexuality instruction
2 available for public inspection pursuant to chapter 610 prior to
3 the use of such materials in actual instruction.

4 [7. No school district or charter school, or its personnel
5 or agents, shall provide abortion services, or permit a person or
6 entity to offer, sponsor, or furnish in any manner any course
7 materials or instruction relating to human sexuality or sexually
8 transmitted diseases to its students if such person or entity is
9 a provider of abortion services.

10 8. As used in this section, the following terms mean:

11 (1) "Abortion", the same meaning as such term is defined in
12 section 188.015;

13 (2) "Abortion services":

14 (a) Performing, inducing, or assisting in the performance
15 or inducing of an abortion which is not necessary to save the
16 life of the mother;

17 (b) Encouraging a patient to have an abortion or referring
18 a patient for an abortion, which is not necessary to save the
19 life of the mother; or

20 (c) Developing or dispensing drugs, chemicals, or devices
21 intended to be used to induce an abortion which is not necessary
22 to save the life of the mother.]" ; and

23 Further amend the title and enacting clause accordingly.
