AN ACT

To repeal section 302.183, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof one new section relating to driver's licenses compliant with the federal REAL ID Act of 2015, with an emergency clause.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 302.183, RSMo, is repealed and one new section 2 enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 302.183, to read as follows:

302.183. 1. Notwithstanding any provision of this chapter that requires 2 an applicant to provide reasonable proof of residence for issuance or renewal of 3 a noncommercial driver's license, noncommercial instruction permit, or a 4 nondriver's license, an applicant shall not have his or her privacy rights violated 5 in order to obtain or renew a Missouri noncommercial driver's license, 6 noncommercial instruction permit, or a nondriver's license.

7 2. Any data derived from a person's application shall not be sold for commercial purposes to any other organization or any other state without the 8 9 express permission of the applicant without a court order; except such 10 information may be shared with a law enforcement agency, judge, prosecuting attorney, or officer of the court, or with another state for the limited purposes set 11 out in section 302.600 or for conducting driver history checks in compliance with 12the Motor Carrier Safety Improvement Act, 49 U.S.C. 31309. The state of 13Missouri shall protect the privacy of its citizens when handling any written, 14digital, or electronic data, and shall not participate in any standardized 15identification system using driver's and nondriver's license records. For purposes 16 of this subsection, "commercial purposes" does not include data used or compiled 17solely to be used for, or obtained or compiled solely for purposes expressly allowed 18

19 under the Missouri or federal Drivers Privacy Protection Act.

3. Subject to the provisions of this section, the department of revenue shall [not] amend procedures for applying for a driver's license or identification card in order to comply with the goals [or] and standards of the federal REAL ID Act of 2005, any rules or regulations promulgated under the authority granted in such act, [or] and any requirements adopted by the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators for furtherance of the act.

4. [Any] The department of revenue shall issue driver's licenses or identification cards that are compliant with the federal REAL ID Act of 2005, as amended, to all applicants for driver's licenses or identification cards.

30 5. Except as necessary to carry out subsections 3 and 4 of this 31section for the sole purpose of issuing a driver's license or 32identification card that is compliant with the federal REAL ID Act of 332005, as amended, biometric data [previously] shall not be collected, obtained, or retained in connection with motor vehicle registration or operation, the 34issuance or renewal of driver's licenses, or the issuance or renewal of any 3536 identification cards by any department or agency of the state charged with those activities [shall be retrieved and deleted from all databases]. Any such 37 biometric data collected as necessary to carry out subsections 3 and 4 38of this section for the sole purpose of issuing a REAL ID compliant 39 driver's license or identification to a person shall be retained only for 40 41 purposes of complying with the REAL ID Act and only for so long as 42required for compliance with the REAL ID Act. For purposes of this section, "biometric data" includes, but is not limited to: 43

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(1) Facial feature pattern characteristics;

45 (2) Voice data used for comparing live speech with a previously created46 speech model of a person's voice;

47 (3) Iris recognition data containing color or texture patterns or codes;

48 (4) Retinal scans, reading through the pupil to measure blood vessels49 lining the retina;

50 (5) Fingerprint, palm prints, hand geometry, measuring of any and all 51 characteristics of biometric information, including shape and length of fingertips 52 or recording ridge pattern or fingertip characteristics;

53 (6) Eye spacing;

54 (7) Characteristic gait or walk;

55 (8) DNA;

56 (9) Keystroke dynamics, measuring pressure applied to key pads or other 57 digital receiving devices.

58 [5.] 6. No citizen of this state shall have his or her privacy compromised 59 by the state or agents of the state. The state shall within reason protect the 60 sovereignty of the citizens the state is entrusted to protect.

Section B. Because the freedom of travel and ability to access federal facilities is of paramount importance for Missouri citizens, section A of this act is deemed necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, welfare, peace and safety, and is hereby declared to be an emergency act within the meaning of the constitution, and section A of this act shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and approval.

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
