AN ACT

To amend chapter 161, RSMo, by adding thereto one new section relating to assessments for the deaf and hard of hearing.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 161, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto one new 2 section, to be known as section 161.413, to read as follows:

ection, to be known as section 161.413, to read as follows:

161.413. 1. There is hereby established a language assessment

- program to be coordinated by the Missouri commission for the deaf and
- 3 hard of hearing. The purpose of the program is to assess, monitor, and
- 4 track the language developmental milestones of children who are deaf
- 5 or hard of hearing from birth through the age of eight. The recognized
- 6 languages used in the education of children who are deaf and hard of
- 7 hearing are English and American sign language. The scope of the
- 8 program includes children who may use one or more communication
- 9 modes in American sign language, English literacy and, if applicable,
- 10 spoken English and visual supplements.
- 11 2. On and after July 1, 2019, an annual language assessment shall
- 12 be given to each child who is deaf or hard of hearing and who is less
- 13 than nine years of age. Language assessments shall be provided either
- 14 through early intervention services administered by the Missouri
- 15 commission for the deaf and hard of hearing, or if the child is three
- 16 years of age or older, through the school district in which the child is
- 17 enrolled. Such language assessments shall be provided in accordance
- 18 with the provisions of this section and any recommendations adopted
- 19 pursuant to this section.
- 20 3. There is hereby established within the commission an advisory
- 21 committee on the language assessment program. The advisory

- 22 committee shall consist of twelve members as follows:
- 23 (1) Nine members of the advisory committee shall be appointed 24 by the governor, by and with the consent of the senate, as follows:
- 25 (a) One member shall be a credentialed teacher of the deaf who 26 uses both ASL and English during instruction;
- 27 (b) One member shall be a credentialed teacher of the deaf who 28 uses spoken English with or without visual supplements during 29 instruction;
- 30 (c) One member shall be a credentialed teacher of the deaf who 31 has expertise in curriculum development and instruction of ASL and 32 English;
- 33 (d) One member shall be a credentialed teacher of the deaf who 34 has expertise in assessing language development in both ASL and 35 English;
- 36 (e) One member shall be a speech language pathologist who has 37 experience working with children from birth through the age of eight;
- 38 (f) One member shall be a professional with a linguistic 39 background who conducts research on language outcomes of children 40 who are deaf or hard of hearing and use ASL and English;
- 41 (g) One member shall be a parent of a child who is deaf or hard 42 of hearing and who uses both ASL and English;
- 43 (h) One member shall be a parent of a child who is deaf or hard 44 of hearing and who uses spoken English with or without visual 45 supplements; and
- 46 (i) One member who is knowledgeable about teaching and using 47 both ASL and English in the education of children who are deaf and 48 hard of hearing;
- 49 (2) Three members of the advisory committee shall be ex officio 50 members as follows:
- 51 (a) One member shall be the executive director of the 52 commission;
- 53 (b) One member shall be the commission member representing 54 the Missouri school for the deaf, or such commission member's 55 designee;
- 56 (c) One member shall be the commission member representing 57 the state board of education, or such commission member's designee.
- 58 4. The executive director of the commission shall call an

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organizational meeting of the advisory committee on or before September 1, 2017. At such organizational meeting, the members shall elect a chairperson and vice-chairperson from the membership of the advisory committee. The advisory committee may meet at any time and at any place within the state on the call of the chairperson. A quorum of the advisory committee shall be seven members. All actions of the advisory committee shall be by motion adopted by a majority of those members present when there is a quorum. Any vacancy on the committee shall be filled in accordance with initial appointment procedures.

- 5. On or before January 31, 2019, the advisory committee shall develop specific action plans and make recommendations necessary to fully implement the language assessment program. In carrying out its charge under this section, the committee shall:
- 73 (1) Collaborate with the office of special education in the 74 department of elementary and secondary education;
 - (2) Solicit input from professionals trained in the language development and education of children who are deaf or hard of hearing on the selection of specific language developmental milestones;
- 78 (3) Review, recommend, and monitor the use of existing and 79 available language assessments for children who are deaf or hard of 80 hearing;
 - (4) Identify and recommend qualifications of language professionals with knowledge of the use of evidence-based, best practices in English and American sign language who can be available to advocate at IEP team meetings;
 - (5) Identify qualifications of language assessment evaluators with knowledge on the use of evidence-based, best practices with children who are deaf or hard of hearing and the resources for locating such evaluators; and
- (6) Identify procedures and methods for communicating information on language acquisition, assessment results, milestones, assessment tools used and progress of the child to the parent or legal guardian of such child, teachers and other professionals involved in the early intervention and education of such child.
- 94 6. The specific action plans and recommendations developed by 95 the advisory committee shall include, but are not limited to, the

96 following:

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- 97 (1) Language assessments that include data collection and timely
 98 tracking of the child's development so as to provide information about
 99 the child's receptive and expressive language compared to such child's
 100 linguistically age-appropriate peers who are not deaf or hard of
 101 hearing;
- (2) Language assessments conducted in accordance with standardized norms and timelines in order to monitor and track language developmental milestones in receptive, expressive, social, and pragmatic language acquisition and developmental stages to show progress in American sign language literacy, English literacy, or both, for all children who are deaf or hard of hearing from birth through the age of eight;
 - (3) Language assessments delivered in the child's mode of communication and which have been validated for the specific purposes for which each assessment is used, and appropriately normed;
- 112 (4) Language assessments administered by individuals who are 113 proficient in ASL for ASL assessments and English for English 114 assessments;
- 115 (5) Use of assessment results, in addition to the assessment 116 required by federal law, for guidance on the language developmental 117 discussions by IEP teams when assessing the child's progress in 118 language development;
- 119 (6) Reporting of assessment results to the parents or legal 120 guardian of the child and the applicable agency;
- 121 (7) Reporting of assessment results on an aggregated basis to the 122 committees on education of the house of representatives and the senate; 123 and
- 124 (8) Reporting of assessment results to the members of the child's 125 IEP team, which may be used, in addition to the assessment required 126 by federal law, by the child's IEP team, as applicable, to track the 127 child's progress, and to establish or modify the IEP.
- 7. The department of elementary and secondary education, the department of health and senior services and the state school for the deaf shall enter into interagency agreements with the commission to share statewide aggregate data.
- 8. On or before January 31, 2019, and each January thirty-first

133 thereafter, the commission shall publish a report that is specific to language and literacy developmental milestones of children who are 134 135 deaf or hard of hearing for each age from birth through the age of eight, including those who are deaf or hard of hearing and have other 136 137 disabilities, relative to such children's peers who are not deaf or hard of hearing. Such report shall be based on existing data reported in 138 compliance with the federally required state performance plan on 139 pupils with disabilities. The commission shall publish the report on its 140 website. 141

- 9. The advisory committee established under this section shall expire on July 1, 2019.
 - 10. As used in this section the following terms shall mean:
- 145 (1) "ASL", American sign language;

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- 146 (2) "Commission", the Missouri commission for the deaf and hard 147 of hearing;
- 148 (3) "English", English literacy, spoken English, signing exact 149 English and morphemic system of signs, CASE, cued speech and any 150 other visual supplements;
- 151 (4) "IEP", individualized education program;
- 152 (5) "Language", a complex and dynamic system of conventional symbols that is used in various modes for thought and communication;
- 154 (6) "Literacy", includes the developmental stages of literacy, 155 including pre-emergent, emergent and novice levels, as necessary 156 beginning stages to master a language.
