The state of Missouri has one of the finest conservation departments in the country. I hope this guide provides your family with the information you need to begin your next adventure into our state's great outdoors.



The Missouri Department of Conservation regulates these activities to ensure our state's natural resources are maintained for generations to come. Before hunting, please pay close attention to these regulations.



Local Conservation Agents

The Missouri Department of Conservation employs agents who serve each Missouri county. KATY TRAIL

The Katy Trail is one of Missouri's longest trails. The 237-mile trail stretches across most of the state and more than half of the trail follows Lewis and Clark's historic journey along the

Missouri River.

Rocheport is a popular tourist destination for those who use the trail within our district, but the trail also goes through Hartsburg, McBaine, Clifton City and



Boonville, and connects to the trail systems in Columbia.

The trail is ideal for hiking, running or cycling on just about any kind of bike. Horseback riding is also allowed on a 35-mile section of the trail, from Sedalia to Clinton.

Runners love to use the Katy Trail for long distance runs, because it is flat and scenic and the crushed limestone trail surface is easy on their legs. Runners and hikers are encouraged to carry their own water.

How Do I Get An MDC Permit Card?

1. Study and pass the Missouri Hunter Education Course

The online course costs \$15. Visit <u>huntfish.mdc.mo.gov/</u> <u>hunting-trapping/hunter-education-skills-training</u> for more information.

2. Complete the age-dependent certification requirements

If you are 16 years or older, you can immediately print your proof of completion after passing the online course. If you are under 16, you must print your proof of completion and bring it to a Hunter Education Skills Session.

3. Obtain your Conservation Permit Card

If you are 16 years or older, your permanent Conservation Permit Card will be mailed to you upon completion of the online course. If you are under 16, you'll receive your card after completing the Hunter Education Skills Session.
