AN ACT

To repeal sections 167.903, 168.021, and 169.596, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof six new sections relating to workforce development in elementary and secondary education, with an effective date for certain sections.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 167.903, 168.021, and 169.596, RSMo,

 - 161.214. 1. For purposes of this section, the
- 2 following terms shall mean:
- 3 (1) "Board", the state board of education;
- 4 (2) "Department", the department of elementary and
- 5 secondary education;
- 6 (3) "School innovation team", a group of natural
- 7 persons representing:
- 8 (a) A single elementary or secondary school;
- 9 (b) A group of two or more elementary or secondary
- 10 schools within the same school district that share common
- 11 interests, such as geographical location or educational
- 12 focus, or that sequentially serve classes of students as
- 13 they progress through elementary and secondary education;
- 14 (c) A group of two or more elementary or secondary
- 15 schools not within the same school district that share
- 16 common interests, such as geographical location or

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educational focus, or that sequentially serve classes of students as they progress through elementary and secondary education;

- (d) A single school district; or
- 21 (e) A group of two or more school districts that share 22 common interests, such as geographical location or 23 educational focus, or that sequentially serve classes of 24 students as they progress through elementary and secondary 25 education;
 - (4) "School innovation waiver", a waiver granted by the board to a single school, group of schools, single school district, or group of school districts pursuant to this section, in which the school, group of schools, school district, or group of school districts is exempt from a specific requirement imposed by chapter 160, chapter 161, chapter 162, chapter 167, chapter 170, or chapter 171, or any regulations promulgated thereunder by the board or the department. Any school innovation waiver granted to a school district or group of school districts shall be applicable to every elementary and secondary school within the school district or group of school districts unless the plan specifically provides otherwise.
- 2. Any school innovation team seeking a school innovation waiver may submit a plan to the board for one or more of the following purposes:
- 42 (1) Improving student readiness for employment, higher 43 education, vocational training, technical training, or any 44 other form of career and job training;
 - (2) Increasing the compensation of teachers; or
- 46 (3) Improving the recruitment, retention, training, 47 preparation, or professional development of teachers.
- 48 3. Any plan for a school innovation waiver shall:

49 (1) Identify the specific provision of law for which a 50 waiver is being requested and provide an explanation for why 51 the specific provision of law inhibits the ability of the 52 school or school district to accomplish the goal stated in 53 the plan;

- (2) Demonstrate that the intent of the specific provision of law can be addressed in a more effective, efficient or economical manner and that the waiver or modification is necessary to implement the plan;
- 58 (3) Include measurable annual performance targets and goals for the implementation of the plan;
- 60 (4) Specify the innovations to be pursued in meeting 61 one or more of the goals listed in subsection 2 of this 62 section:
- (5) Demonstrate parental, school employee, and community and business support for, and engagement with, the plan; and
- 66 (6) Be approved by at least the minimum number of 67 people required to be on the school innovation team prior to 68 submitting the plan for approval.
- 4. (1) In evaluating a plan submitted by a school innovation team under subsection 2 of this section, the board shall consider whether the plan will:
- 72 (a) Improve the preparation, counseling, and overall 73 readiness of students for postsecondary life;
- 74 (b) Increase teacher salaries in a financially 75 sustainable and prudent manner; or
- 76 (c) Increase the attractiveness of the teaching
 77 profession for prospective teachers and active teachers
 78 alike.
- 79 (2) The board may approve any plan submitted under 80 subsection 2 of this section if it determines that:

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81 (a) The plan successfully demonstrates the ability to 82 address the intent of the provision of law to be waived in a 83 more effective, efficient or economical manner;

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- (b) The waivers or modifications are demonstrated to
 be necessary to stimulate improved student readiness for
 postsecondary life, increase teacher salaries, or increase
 the attractiveness of the teaching profession for
 prospective teachers and active teachers;
- (c) The plan has demonstrated sufficient participation from among the teachers, principals, superintendent, faculty, school board, parents, and the community at large; and
- 93 (d) The plan is based upon sound educational 94 practices, does not endanger the health and safety of 95 students or staff, and does not compromise equal opportunity 96 for learning.
- 97 (3) The board may propose modifications to the plan in 98 cooperation with the school innovation team.
- 99 5. Any waiver granted under this section shall be
 100 effective for a period of no longer than three school years
 101 beginning the school year following the school year in which
 102 the waiver is approved. Any waiver may be renewed. No more
 103 than one school innovation waiver shall be in effect with
 104 respect to any one elementary or secondary school at one
 105 time.
 - 6. This section shall not be construed to allow the state board of education to authorize the waiver of any statutory requirements relating to teacher certification, teacher tenure, or any requirement imposed by federal law.
 - 7. The board may promulgate rules implementing the provisions of this section. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created

- under the authority delegated in this section shall become
- 114 effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of
- the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section
- 116 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and
- if any of the powers vested with the general assembly
- 118 pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective
- 119 date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently
- 120 held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking
- 121 authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28,
- 122 2021, shall be invalid and void.
 - 167.903. 1. Each student prior to his or her ninth
 - 2 grade year at a public school, including a charter school,
 - 3 [may] shall develop with help from the school's [guidance]
 - 4 counselors [a personal plan of study] an individual career
 - 5 and academic plan, which shall be reviewed [regularly, as
 - 6 needed] once per semester by school personnel and the
 - 7 student's parent or guardian and updated based upon the
 - 8 needs of the student. Each plan shall present a sequence of
 - 9 courses and experiences that conclude with the student
- 10 reaching his or her postsecondary goals, with implementation
- of the plan [of study] transferring to the program of
- 12 postsecondary education or training upon the student's high
- 13 school graduation. The plan shall include, but not be
- 14 limited to:
- 15 (1) Requirements for graduation from the school
- 16 district or charter school;
- 17 (2) Career or postsecondary goals;
- 18 (3) Coursework or program of study related to career
- 19 and postsecondary goals, which shall include, if relevant,
- 20 opportunities that the district or school may not directly
- 21 offer;

- (4) Grade-appropriate and career-related experiences,as outlined in the grade-level expectations of the Missouri
- 24 comprehensive [guidance] program; and
- 25 (5) Student assessments, interest inventories, or
- 26 academic results needed to develop, review, and revise the
- 27 personal plan of study, which shall include, if relevant,
- 28 assessments, inventories, or academic results that the
- 29 school district or charter school may not offer.
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 2. Each school district shall adopt a policy to permit
- 31 the waiver of the requirements of this section for any
- 32 student with a disability if recommended by the student's
- 33 IEP committee. For purposes of this subsection, "IEP" means
- 34 individualized education program.
- 35 3. Each student prior to the completion of the second
- 36 semester of his or her twelfth grade year shall include, as
- 37 part of his or her individual career and academic plan, a
- 38 declaration as to his or her postsecondary plans, including,
- 39 but not limited to:
- 40 (1) Confirming employment upon graduation;
- 41 (2) Acceptance to an institution of higher education,
- 42 whether a two-year institution or a four-year institution;
- 43 (3) Acceptance to participate in a vocational,
- 44 technical, or other training program designed to prepare the
- 45 student for employment; or
- 46 (4) Commitment to enlist in the armed forces.
 - 167.907. 1. No pupil shall receive a certificate of
- 2 graduation from any public or private school unless he or
- 3 she has completed and submitted the Free Application for
- 4 Federal Student Aid, as maintained by the United States
- 5 Department of Education.
- 6 2. A student shall be exempt from the requirement to
- 7 complete or submit the Free Application for Federal Student

8 Aid under subsection 1 of this section if such student

- 9 submits to the student's school:
- 10 (1) Written confirmation of a commitment to enlist in
- 11 the armed forces; or
- 12 (2) A written document or form, signed by the
- 13 student's parent or guardian, attesting that he or she
- 14 understands what the application is and has chosen not to
- 15 file such application.
 - 167.908. The department of higher education and
- 2 workforce development shall, by rule, establish a procedure
- 3 for providing the means and capability for high school
- 4 students enrolled in career and technical education programs
- 5 described under section 170.029 to complete an application
- 6 for aid through the United States Department of Labor,
- 7 Employment and Training Administration pursuant to the
- 8 federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act. The
- 9 department shall work with school districts that deliver
- 10 career and technical education programs to educate students
- on the value of the aid that is available to them through
- 12 the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act. The
- 13 department shall also meet the following thresholds:
- 14 (1) For the 2021-2022 school year, the department
- 15 shall ensure that fifty percent of all department of
- 16 elementary and secondary education area career centers that
- 17 deliver career and technical education programs have the
- 18 means and capability for students at such schools to
- 19 complete an application for aid through the United States
- 20 Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration
- 21 pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity
- 22 Act.
- 23 (2) For the 2022-2023 school year, the department
- 24 shall ensure that seventy percent of all department of

25 elementary and secondary education area career centers that

- 26 deliver career and technical education programs have the
- 27 means and capability for students at such schools to
- 28 complete an application for aid through the United States
- 29 Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration
- 30 pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity
- 31 Act.
- 32 (3) For the 2023-2024 school year, the department
- 33 shall ensure that ninety percent of all department of
- 34 elementary and secondary education area career centers that
- 35 deliver career and technical education programs have the
- 36 means and capability for students at such schools to
- 37 complete an application for aid through the United States
- 38 Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration
- 39 pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity
- 40 Act.
- 41 (4) For the 2024-2025 school year and every school
- 42 year thereafter, the department shall ensure that one
- 43 hundred percent of all department of elementary and
- 44 secondary education area career centers that deliver career
- 45 and technical education programs have the means and
- 46 capability for students at such schools to complete an
- 47 application for aid through the United States Department of
- 48 Labor, Employment and Training Administration pursuant to
- 49 the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act.
 - 168.021. 1. Certificates of license to teach in the
- 2 public schools of the state shall be granted as follows:
- 3 (1) By the state board, under rules and regulations
- 4 prescribed by it:
- 5 (a) Upon the basis of college credit;
- 6 (b) Upon the basis of examination;

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By the state board, under rules and regulations 7 prescribed by the state board with advice from the advisory 8 9 council established by section 168.015 to any individual who presents to the state board a valid doctoral degree from an 10 accredited institution of higher education accredited by a 11 regional accrediting association such as North Central 12 13 Association. Such certificate shall be limited to the major 14 area of postgraduate study of the holder, shall be issued only after successful completion of the examination required 15 16 for graduation pursuant to rules adopted by the state board of education, and shall be restricted to those certificates 17 established pursuant to subdivision (2) of subsection 3 of 18 this section; 19

- (3) By the state board, which shall issue the professional certificate classification in both the general and specialized areas most closely aligned with the current areas of certification approved by the state board, commensurate with the years of teaching experience of the applicant, and based upon the following criteria:
- (a) Recommendation of a state-approved baccalaureate-level teacher preparation program;
- 28 (b) Successful attainment of the Missouri qualifying
 29 score on the exit assessment for teachers or administrators
 30 designated by the state board of education. Applicants who
 31 have not successfully achieved a qualifying score on the
 32 designated examinations will be issued a two-year
 33 nonrenewable provisional certificate; and
- (c) Upon completion of a background check as
 prescribed in section 168.133 and possession of a valid
 teaching certificate in the state from which the applicant's
 teacher preparation program was completed;

38 By the state board, under rules prescribed by it, on the basis of a relevant bachelor's degree, or higher 39 40 degree, and a passing score for the designated exit examination, for individuals whose academic degree and 41 professional experience are suitable to provide a basis for 42 instruction solely in the subject matter of banking or 43 financial responsibility, at the discretion of the state 44 45 board. Such certificate shall be limited to the major area of study of the holder and shall be restricted to those 46 47 certificates established under subdivision (2) of subsection 3 of this section. Holders of certificates granted under 48 this subdivision shall be exempt from the teacher tenure act 49 under sections 168.102 to 168.130 and each school district 50 shall have the decision-making authority on whether to hire 51 the holders of such certificates; 52 (5) By the state board, under rules and regulations 53 prescribed by it, on the basis of certification by the 54 American Board for Certification of Teacher Excellence 55 56 (ABCTE) and verification of ability to work with children as demonstrated by sixty contact hours in any one of the 57 following areas as validated by the school principal: 58 contact hours in the classroom, of which at least forty-five 59 must be teaching; sixty contact hours as a substitute 60 teacher, with at least thirty consecutive hours in the same 61 classroom; sixty contact hours of teaching in a private 62 63 school; or sixty contact hours of teaching as a 64 paraprofessional, for an initial four-year ABCTE certificate of license to teach, except that such certificate shall not 65 be granted for the areas of early childhood education, or 66 special education. For certification in the area of 67 elementary education, ninety contact hours in the classroom 68 shall be required, of which at least thirty shall be in an 69

70 elementary classroom. Upon the completion of the

- 71 requirements listed in paragraphs (a), (b), (c), and (d) of
- 72 this subdivision, an applicant shall be eligible to apply
- 73 for a career continuous professional certificate under
- 74 subdivision (3) of subsection 3 of this section:
- 75 (a) Completion of thirty contact hours of professional
- 76 development within four years, which may include hours spent
- in class in an appropriate college curriculum;
- 78 (b) Validated completion of two years of the mentoring
- 79 program of the American Board for Certification of Teacher
- 80 Excellence or a district mentoring program approved by the
- 81 state board of education;
- 82 (c) Attainment of a successful performance-based
- 83 teacher evaluation; and
- (d) Participation in a beginning teacher assistance
- 85 program; or
- 86 (6) By the state board, under rules and regulations
- 87 prescribed by it, which shall issue an initial visiting
- 88 scholars certificate at the discretion of the board, based
- 89 on the following criteria:
- 90 (a) Verification from the hiring school district that
- 91 the applicant will be employed [as part of a business-
- 92 education partnership initiative designed] to build career
- 93 pathways systems for students in a grade or grades not lower
- 94 than the ninth grade for which the applicant's academic
- 95 degree or professional experience qualifies him or her;
- 96 (b) Appropriate and relevant bachelor's degree or
- 97 higher, occupational license, or industry-recognized
- 98 credential;
- 99 (c) Completion of the application for a one-year
- 100 visiting scholars certificate; and

101 (d) Completion of a background check as prescribed 102 under section 168.133.

103 The initial visiting scholars certificate shall certify the 104 holder of such certificate to teach for one year. An 105 applicant shall be eligible to renew an initial visiting 106 scholars certificate a maximum of two times, based upon the 107 completion of the requirements listed under paragraphs (a), (b), and (d) of this subdivision; completion of professional 108 development required by the school district and school; and 109 110 attainment of a satisfactory performance-based teacher 111 evaluation.

- 112 2. All valid teaching certificates issued pursuant to law or state board policies and regulations prior to 113 114 September 1, 1988, shall be exempt from the professional 115 development requirements of this section and shall continue 116 in effect until they expire, are revoked or suspended, as 117 provided by law. When such certificates are required to be renewed, the state board or its designee shall grant to each 118 119 holder of such a certificate the certificate most nearly 120 equivalent to the one so held. Anyone who holds, as of 121 August 28, 2003, a valid PC-I, PC-II, or continuous 122 professional certificate shall, upon expiration of his or her current certificate, be issued the appropriate level of 123 124 certificate based upon the classification system established 125 pursuant to subsection 3 of this section.
- 3. (1) Certificates of license to teach in the public schools of the state shall be based upon minimum requirements prescribed by the state board of education which shall include completion of a background check as prescribed in section 168.133. The state board shall provide for the following levels of professional

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certification: an initial professional certificate and a career continuous professional certificate.

- issued upon completion of requirements established by the state board of education and shall be valid based upon verification of actual teaching within a specified time period established by the state board of education. The state board shall require holders of the four-year initial professional certificate to:
- 141 (a) Participate in a mentoring program approved and 142 provided by the district for a minimum of two years;
 - (b) Complete thirty contact hours of professional development, which may include hours spent in class in an appropriate college curriculum, or for holders of a certificate under subdivision (4) of subsection 1 of this section, an amount of professional development in proportion to the certificate holder's hours in the classroom, if the certificate holder is employed less than full time; and
- 150 (c) Participate in a beginning teacher assistance 151 program.
- The career continuous professional 152 (3) (a) certificate shall be issued upon verification of completion 153 of four years of teaching under the initial professional 154 155 certificate and upon verification of the completion of the 156 requirements articulated in paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of 157 subdivision (2) of this subsection or paragraphs (a), (b), (c), and (d) of subdivision (5) of subsection 1 of this 158 159 section.
- (b) The career continuous professional certificate
 shall be continuous based upon verification of actual
 employment in an educational position as provided for in
 state board guidelines and completion of fifteen contact

- 164 hours of professional development per year which may include
- 165 hours spent in class in an appropriate college curriculum.
- 166 Should the possessor of a valid career continuous
- 167 professional certificate fail, in any given year, to meet
- 168 the fifteen-hour professional development requirement, the
- 169 possessor may, within two years, make up the missing hours.
- 170 In order to make up for missing hours, the possessor shall
- 171 first complete the fifteen-hour requirement for the current
- 172 year and then may count hours in excess of the current year
- 173 requirement as make-up hours. Should the possessor fail to
- 174 make up the missing hours within two years, the certificate
- 175 shall become inactive. In order to reactivate the
- 176 certificate, the possessor shall complete twenty-four
- 177 contact hours of professional development which may include
- 178 hours spent in the classroom in an appropriate college
- 179 curriculum within the six months prior to or after
- 180 reactivating his or her certificate. The requirements of
- 181 this paragraph shall be monitored and verified by the local
- 182 school district which employs the holder of the career
- 183 continuous professional certificate.
- 184 (c) A holder of a career continuous professional
- 185 certificate shall be exempt from the professional
- 186 development contact hour requirements of paragraph (b) of
- 187 this subdivision if such teacher has a local professional
- 188 development plan in place within such teacher's school
- 189 district and meets two of the three following criteria:
- 190 a. Has ten years of teaching experience as defined by
- 191 the state board of education;
- b. Possesses a master's degree; or
- 193 c. Obtains a rigorous national certification as
- 194 approved by the state board of education.

- 195 Policies and procedures shall be established by 196 which a teacher who was not retained due to a reduction in 197 force may retain the current level of certification. shall also be established policies and procedures allowing a 198 199 teacher who has not been employed in an educational position 200 for three years or more to reactivate his or her last level 201 of certification by completing twenty-four contact hours of 202 professional development which may include hours spent in 203 the classroom in an appropriate college curriculum within 204 the six months prior to or after reactivating his or her certificate. 205
- The state board shall, upon completion of a 206 207 background check as prescribed in section 168.133, issue a 208 professional certificate classification in the areas most 209 closely aligned with an applicant's current areas of 210 certification, commensurate with the years of teaching 211 experience of the applicant, to any person who is hired to teach in a public school in this state and who possesses a 212 213 valid teaching certificate from another state or certification under subdivision (4) of subsection 1 of this 214 section, provided that the certificate holder shall annually 215 complete the state board's requirements for such level of 216 certification, and shall establish policies by which 217 218 residents of states other than the state of Missouri may be 219 assessed a fee for a certificate of license to teach in the public schools of Missouri. Such fee shall be in an amount 220 221 sufficient to recover any or all costs associated with the issuing of a certificate of license to teach. The board 222 223 shall promulgate rules to authorize the issuance of a 224 provisional certificate of license, which shall be valid for 225 three years and shall allow the holder to assume classroom

duties pending the completion of a criminal background check under section 168.133, for any applicant who:

- 228 (1) Is the spouse of a member of the Armed Forces 229 stationed in Missouri;
- (2) Relocated from another state within one year ofthe date of application;
- 232 (3) Underwent a criminal background check in order to
 233 be issued a teaching certificate of license from another
 234 state; and
- 235 (4) Otherwise qualifies under this section.
- 236 The state board may assess to holders of an initial professional certificate a fee, to be deposited into the 237 238 excellence in education revolving fund established pursuant 239 to section 160.268, for the issuance of the career 240 continuous professional certificate. However, such fee shall not exceed the combined costs of issuance and any 241 242 criminal background check required as a condition of issuance. Applicants for the initial ABCTE certificate 243 244 shall be responsible for any fees associated with the program leading to the issuance of the certificate, but 245 nothing in this section shall prohibit a district from 246 developing a policy that permits fee reimbursement. 247
- 7. Any member of the public school retirement system 248 249 of Missouri who entered covered employment with ten or more 250 years of educational experience in another state or states and held a certificate issued by another state and 251 subsequently worked in a school district covered by the 252 public school retirement system of Missouri for ten or more 253 years who later became certificated in Missouri shall have 254 255 that certificate dated back to his or her original date of 256 employment in a Missouri public school.

257 Within thirty days of receiving an application from 258 a spouse of an active duty member of the Armed Forces of the 259 United States who has been transferred or is scheduled to be transferred to the state of Missouri, or who has been 260 261 transferred or is scheduled to be transferred to an adjacent 262 state and is or will be domiciled in the state of Missouri, or has moved to the state of Missouri on a permanent change-263 264 of-station basis and has successfully completed the 265 background check described under subsection 5 of this 266 section and section 168.133, the state board shall issue to such applicant a full certificate of license to teach, 267 provided that the applicant has paid all necessary fees and 268 269 has otherwise met all requirements to be issued such a 270 certificate.

1. Notwithstanding any other provision of 2 this chapter to the contrary, a retired certificated teacher 3 receiving a retirement benefit from the retirement system established pursuant to sections 169.010 to 169.141 may, 4 without losing his or her retirement benefit, [teach] be 5 6 employed full time for up to [two] four years for a school 7 district covered by such retirement system; provided that 8 the school district has a shortage of certified teachers, as determined by the school district[, and provided that no 9 10 such retired certificated teacher shall be employed as a superintendent. The total number of such retired 11 12 certificated teachers shall not exceed, at any one time, the 13 lesser of ten percent of the total teacher staff for that school district, or five certificated teachers]. A retired 14 certificated teacher receiving a retirement benefit from the 15 retirement system established pursuant to sections 169.010 16 17 to 169.141 may only be employed as a superintendent under 18 this subsection if he or she has been retired for at least

- 19 twelve months prior to such employment, unless such
- 20 employment is immediately necessary due to death,
- 21 disability, or termination for cause of the superintendent
- 22 who held the position being filled.
- 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter
- 24 to the contrary, a person receiving a retirement benefit
- 25 from the retirement system established pursuant to sections
- 26 169.600 to 169.715 may, without losing his or her retirement
- 27 benefit, be employed full time for up to [two] four years
- 28 for a school district covered by such retirement system;
- 29 provided that the school district has a shortage of
- 30 noncertificated employees, as determined by the school
- 31 district. [The total number of such retired noncertificated
- 32 employees shall not exceed, at any one time, the lesser of
- 33 ten percent of the total noncertificated staff for that
- 34 school district, or five employees.]
- 35 3. The total number of retired members working for a
- 36 school district under subsections 1 and 2 of this section
- 37 shall not exceed, at any one time, the lesser of ten percent
- of the total number of employees for that district or ten
- 39 employees.
- 4. The employer's contribution rate shall be paid by
- 41 the hiring school district.
- 42 [4.] 5. In order to hire teachers and noncertificated
- 43 employees pursuant to the provisions of this section, the
- 44 school district shall:
- 45 (1) Show a good faith effort to fill positions with
- 46 nonretired certificated teachers or nonretired
- 47 noncertificated employees;
- 48 (2) Post the vacancy for at least one month;
- 49 (3) Have not offered early retirement incentives for
- 50 either of the previous two years;

- 51 (4) Solicit applications through the local newspaper,52 other media, or teacher education programs;
- 53 (5) Determine there is an insufficient number of 54 eligible applicants for the advertised position; and
- (6) Declare a critical shortage of certificatedteachers or noncertificated employees that is active for oneyear.
- [5.] 6. Any person hired pursuant to this section shall be included in the State Directory of New Hires for purposes of income and eligibility verification pursuant to 42 U.S.C. Section 1320b-7.

Section B. The enactment of section 167.907 and the repeal and reenactment of section 167.903 of this act shall become effective on August 28, 2022.
