## **AN ACT**

To repeal sections 167.624 and 170.310, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof three new sections relating to automated external defibrillators in schools.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

- Section A. Sections 167.624 and 170.310, RSMo, are
- 2 repealed and three new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be
- 3 known as sections 160.111, 167.624, and 170.310, to read as
- 4 follows:
  - 160.111. 1. As used in this section, the following
- 2 terms mean:
- 3 (1) "Automated external defibrillator" or "AED", a
- 4 device that:
- 5 (a) Is used to administer an electric shock through
- 6 the chest wall to the heart;
- 7 (b) Has built-in computers within the device to assess
- 8 the patient's heart rhythm, determine whether defibrillation
- 9 is needed, and administer the shock;
- 10 (c) Has audible or visual prompts, or both, to guide
- 11 the user through the process;
- 12 (d) Has received approval from the U.S. Food and Drug
- 13 Administration of its pre-market modification filed under 21
- 14 U.S.C. Section 360(k), as amended;
- 15 (e) Is capable of recognizing the presence or absence
- 16 of ventricular fibrillation and rapid ventricular
- 17 tachycardia and is capable of determining without

intervention by an operator whether defibrillation should be performed; and

- 20 (f) Upon determining defibrillation should be
  21 performed, either automatically charges and delivers an
  22 electrical impulse to an individual's heart or charges and
  23 delivers an electrical impulse at the command of the
  24 operator;
- 25 (2) "Cardiac arrest", a condition, often sudden, that
  26 is due to abnormal heart rhythms called arrhythmias and that
  27 is generally the result of some underlying form of heart
  28 disease;
- 29 (3) "Cardiopulmonary resuscitation" or "CPR", a
  30 combination of rescue breathing, chest compressions, and
  31 external cardiac massage used to sustain an individual's
  32 life until advanced assistance arrives;
- 33 (4) "Defibrillation", administering an electrical 34 impulse to an individual's heart in order to stop 35 ventricular fibrillation or rapid ventricular tachycardia;
- 36 (5) "Department", the department of elementary and secondary education;
- 38 (6) "Emergency medical services", the transportation 39 and medical care provided to the ill or injured prior to 40 arrival at a medical facility by a licensed emergency 41 medical technician or other health care provider and the 42 continuation of the initial emergency care within a medical 43 facility subject to the approval of the medical staff and 44 governing board of that facility;
- 45 (7) "Extracurricular event", any school-sponsored 46 program or voluntary activity sponsored by the school, local 47 education agency, or an organization sanctioned by the local 48 education agency at which students compete for the purpose 49 of:

50 (a) Receiving an award, rating, recognition, or 51 criticism;

- 52 (b) Qualifying for additional competition; or
- 53 (c) Preparing for and involvement in public
- 54 performances, contests, athletic competitions,
- 55 demonstrations, displays, and club activities;
- 56 (8) "Program coordinator", an individual, appointed by
- 57 the school district, who is responsible for administration
- of the AED program for such individual's public school
- 59 campus;
- 60 (9) "Protocol", currently approved and accepted
- 61 procedures describing specific steps a provider is required
- 62 to follow in assessing and treating a patient;
- 63 (10) "Provider", school personnel of a public school
- 64 campus who have completed training in CPR in addition to
- 65 having knowledge and understanding of an AED's operation and
- 66 use under the requirements of this section;
- 67 (11) "Public school", the same definition as in
- 68 section 160.011;
- 69 (12) "School campus", any public school building or
- 70 cluster of buildings, and grounds around such public school
- 71 building or cluster of buildings, used for any public school
- 72 purpose including, but not limited to, an extracurricular
- 73 activity, organized physical activity courses, early
- 74 childhood education programs, or school district
- 75 administration;
- 76 (13) "School personnel", a school district employee
- 77 approved by the school board or a contract employee of the
- 78 school district who is required to follow school policy and
- 79 **procedures**;
- 80 (14) "School-sponsored event", any event or activity
- 81 sponsored by the public school or school district including,

82 but not limited to, athletic events, booster clubs, parent-

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- 83 teacher organizations, or any activity designed to enhance
- 84 the school curriculum whether on the school campus or not;
- 85 (15) "Ventricular fibrillation", the most common
- 86 arrhythmia that causes cardiac arrest and a condition in
- 87 which the heart's electrical impulses suddenly become
- 88 chaotic, often without warning, causing the heart's pumping
- 89 action to stop abruptly.
- 90 2. For the 2025-26 school year and all subsequent
- 91 school years:
- 92 (1) Each school campus shall install automated
- 93 external defibrillators as required in this section;
- 94 (2) Appropriate school personnel shall have been
- 95 adequately trained in the use of such AEDs as required under
- 96 this section before the beginning of the 2025-26 school
- 97 year; and
- 98 (3) Appropriate school personnel shall be trained
- 99 annually in the use of such AEDs as required under this
- 100 section.
- 3. (1) An automated external defibrillator meets the
- 102 requirements of this section if such AED is:
- 103 (a) Approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration;
- 104 (b) An automated kind of external defibrillator
- 105 requiring provider intervention to initiate a defibrillation
- 106 shock; and
- 107 (c) Capable of automatically collecting data.
- 108 (2) No modifications shall be made to AED equipment by
- 109 the provider or the service that results in deviation from:
- 110 (a) The original manufacturer's specifications; or
- 111 (b) AED protocols, which are:
- a. Early access, which is calling 911;
- b. Early CPR, which is starting CPR immediately;

- 114 c. Early defibrillation, which is using the on-site 115 AED within three to five minutes of onset; and
- d. Early advanced care, which is trained health care
- 117 providers arriving to provide advanced care.
- 118 4. (1) Each school district shall designate
- appropriate personnel to be responsible for the maintenance
- 120 of each automated external defibrillator.
- 121 (2) All components of each AED and integrated data
- 122 recording system shall be inspected by a qualified service
- 123 technician at least one time per calendar year or as
- 124 recommended by the manufacturer to ensure that the AED
- 125 **equipment:**
- 126 (a) Meets original manufacturer's specifications; and
- 127 (b) Maintains the currently approved treatment
- 128 protocols based on the current American Heart Association
- 129 scientific guidelines, standards, and recommendations for
- 130 the use of the AED.
- 131 (3) The battery of the AED shall be maintained and
- 132 replaced in accordance with manufacturer's specifications.
- 133 (4) All maintenance and repairs shall be performed by
- 134 a qualified service technician recognized by the
- 135 manufacturer.
- 136 (5) Written records shall be maintained for all
- 137 maintenance, repairs, and inspections performed on all
- 138 components for mandated annual state reporting purposes.
- 5. (1) Each public school shall designate appropriate
- 140 school personnel to be responsible for ensuring the
- 141 availability of each automated external defibrillator as
- 142 provided in this subsection.
- 143 (2) The regular location of each AED shall be based on
- the following:
- 145 (a) The size and physical layout of the school campus;

146 (b) The number and ages of individuals on the school 147 campus;

- 148 (c) Types and locations of curricular,
- 149 extracurricular, and school-sponsored events; and
- 150 (d) Design features that are unique to particular
- 151 buildings on the school campus.
- 152 (3) During school hours, an AED shall be placed at
- designated locations. Such locations shall be specific to
- each school campus but shall allow such AED to be easily
- seen by school personnel. Such locations shall allow school
- 156 personnel to retrieve such AED outside of normal school
- 157 hours.
- 158 (4) In conjunction with the location standards listed
- in subdivisions (2) and (3) of this subsection, AEDs shall
- 160 be placed in areas where there is likely to be high traffic
- 161 or congregation, such as auditoriums, cafeterias, or
- 162 gymnasiums, and areas where risk of injury may be elevated
- on each school campus, in an easily accessible location of
- such areas, to be determined after consultation with the
- 165 local emergency medical services system or emergency medical
- 166 response agency.
- 6. The program coordinator shall:
- 168 (1) Maintain current provider status in CPR and the
- use of an automated external defibrillator;
- 170 (2) Ensure that providers on the school campus receive
- 171 appropriate training in the use and maintenance of the
- 172 public school's AEDs;
- 173 (3) Oversee training operations for the public school
- 174 and maintain organizational training reports;
- 175 (4) Ensure that AED equipment is maintained according
- 176 to manufacturer and treatment protocol specifications based
- 177 on the current American Heart Association scientific

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guidelines, standards, and recommendations for the use of each AED and submit maintenance records to the department as required by the department;

- 181 (5) Provide professional development opportunities 182 annually for providers and all school personnel, if 183 applicable;
- 184 (6) Verify credentials of school personnel functioning 185 as a provider within the public school;
  - (7) Review each use of each AED; and
- 187 (8) Report, in a format approved by the department,
  188 each use of an AED. Such report shall be completed and
  189 submitted to the department within thirty days following
  190 such use. Such form shall contain at least relevant
  191 information regarding the incidence and use of the AED and
  192 the client outcome.
- 7. Appropriate training of providers and anticipated rescuers in the use of an automated external defibrillator and in CPR shall incorporate at least the following:
  - (1) Testing of psychomotor skills based on the most current version of the American Heart Association scientific guidelines, standards, and recommendations for the use of each AED;
  - (2) Providing CPR as published in the most current guidelines of the American Heart Association, American Red Cross, or in equivalent course materials;
  - (3) Coordinating with the local emergency medical services system or emergency medical response agency; and
- 205 (4) An ongoing quality improvement program to monitor 206 training and evaluate response with each use of an AED.
- 8. Automated external defibrillator and cardiopulmonary resuscitation training shall count fully

toward professional development requirements under section168.021.

- 9. Before April thirtieth in each school year, each public school shall report to the department on the implementation and status of automated external defibrillator availability on each school campus. The department shall compile such data and submit a report to the general assembly before the end of each school year.
  - and regulations for the administration of this section. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2024, shall be invalid and void.

1. Each school board in the state, if the school district does not presently have a program as described below, may develop and implement a program to train the students and employees of the district in the administration of cardiopulmonary resuscitation and other lifesaving methods, as they determine best, and may consult the department of public safety, the state fire marshal's office, the local fire protection authorities, and others as the board sees fit. The board may make completion of the program a requirement for graduation. Any trained employee shall be held harmless and immune from any civil liability

- 13 lifesaving methods in good faith and according to standard
- 14 medical practices.
- 15 2. For the 2024-25 school year and all subsequent
- school years, district training implemented pursuant to the
- 17 provisions of this section shall include appropriate
- 18 training in the use of an automated external defibrillator
- 19 as required in section 160.111. Each school district shall
- 20 comply with all applicable provisions of sections 160.011
- 21 and 190.092 relating to placement, maintenance, testing, and
- 22 inspection of automated external defibrillators. Any
- 23 trained employee shall be held harmless and immune from any
- 24 civil liability for the use of an automated external
- 25 defibrillator in good faith and according to standard
- 26 medical practices.
  - 170.310. 1. For school year 2017-18 and each school
- 2 year thereafter, upon graduation from high school, pupils in
- 3 public schools and charter schools shall have received
- 4 thirty minutes of cardiopulmonary resuscitation instruction
- 5 and training in the proper performance of the Heimlich
- 6 maneuver or other first aid for choking given any time
- 7 during a pupil's four years of high school.
- 8 2. Beginning in school year 2017-18, any public school
- 9 or charter school serving grades nine through twelve shall
- 10 provide enrolled students instruction in cardiopulmonary
- 11 resuscitation. Students with disabilities may participate
- 12 to the extent appropriate as determined by the provisions of
- 13 the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act or Section
- 14 504 of the Rehabilitation Act (29 U.S.C. Section 794), as
- 15 amended. Instruction shall be included in the district's
- 16 existing health or physical education curriculum.
- 17 Instruction shall be based on a program established by the

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American Heart Association or the American Red Cross, or through a nationally recognized program based on the most current national evidence-based emergency cardiovascular care guidelines, and psychomotor skills development shall be incorporated into the instruction. For purposes of this section, "psychomotor skills" means the use of hands-on

- 24 practicing and skills testing to support cognitive learning.
  - 3. For the 2024-25 school year and all subsequent school years, instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation pursuant to the provisions of this section shall include appropriate instruction and training in the use of an automated external defibrillator as required pursuant to the provisions of section 160.111.
- 31 The teacher of the cardiopulmonary resuscitation course or unit shall not be required to be a certified 32 trainer of cardiopulmonary resuscitation if the instruction 33 34 is not designed to result in certification of students. Instruction that is designed to result in certification 35 36 being earned shall be required to be taught by an authorized cardiopulmonary instructor. Schools may develop agreements 37 with any local chapter of a voluntary organization of first 38 responders to provide the required hands-on practice and 39 skills testing. For purposes of this subsection, "first 40 41 responders" shall include telecommunicator first responders 42 as defined in section 650.320.
  - [4.] 5. The department of elementary and secondary education may promulgate rules to implement this section. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This

section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the
powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter
52 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove
and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional,
then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed
or adopted after August 28, 2012, shall be invalid and void.

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
