## AN ACT

To repeal section 171.031, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof one new section relating to public schools.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 171.031, RSMo, is repealed and one new section enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 171.031, to read as follows:

171.031. 1. Each school board shall prepare annually 2 a calendar for the school term, specifying the opening date, 3 days of planned attendance, and providing a minimum term of at least one hundred seventy-four days for schools with a 4 five-day school week or one hundred forty-two days for 5 6 schools with a four-day school week, and one thousand forty-7 four hours of actual pupil attendance. In school year 2019-8 20 and subsequent years, one thousand forty-four hours of 9 actual pupil attendance shall be required for the school 10 term with no minimum number of school days. In addition, 11 such calendar shall include six make-up days for possible 12 loss of attendance due to inclement weather as defined in subsection 1 of section 171.033. In school year 2019-20 and 13 14 subsequent years, such calendar shall include thirty-six 15 make-up hours for possible loss of attendance due to 16 inclement weather, as defined in subsection 1 of section 17 171.033, with no minimum number of make-up days.

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18 2. Each local school district may set its opening date each year, which date shall be no earlier than fourteen 19 20 calendar days prior to the first Monday in September. No public school district shall select an earlier start date 21 22 unless, for calendars for school years before school year 23 2020-21, the district follows the procedure set forth in subsection 3 of this section. 24 The procedure set forth in 25 subsection 3 of this section shall be unavailable to school districts in preparing their calendars for school year 2020-26 27 21 and for subsequent years.

For calendars for school years before school year 28 3. 2020-21, a district may set an opening date that is more 29 30 than fourteen calendar days prior to the first Monday in September only if the local school board first gives public 31 notice of a public meeting to discuss the proposal of 32 opening school on a date more than fourteen days prior to 33 the first Monday in September, and the local school board 34 35 holds said meeting and, at the same public meeting, a 36 majority of the board votes to allow an earlier opening date. If all of the previous conditions are met, the 37 district may set its opening date more than fourteen 38 calendar days prior to the first Monday in September. 39 The condition provided in this subsection must be satisfied by 40 41 the local school board each year that the board proposes an opening date more than fourteen days before the first Monday 42 43 in September.

4. If any local district violates the provisions of
45 this section, the department of elementary and secondary
46 education shall withhold an amount equal to one quarter of
47 the state funding the district generated under section
48 163.031 for each date the district was in violation of this
49 section.

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The provisions of subsections 2 to 4 of this 50 5. section shall not apply to any school district in which one 51 or more charter schools are operated under the provisions of 52 sections 160.400 to 160.425 or to school districts in which 53 school is in session for twelve months of each calendar year. 54 55 6. The state board of education may grant an exemption from this section to a school district that demonstrates 56 57 highly unusual and extenuating circumstances justifying 58 exemption from the provisions of subsections 2 to 4 of this section. Any exemption granted by the state board of 59 education shall be valid for one academic year only. 60

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
