## AN ACT

To repeal sections 163.172, 168.110, 168.400, 168.500, and 173.232, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof five new sections relating to teacher recruitment and retention.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

	Section A. Sections 163.172, 168.110, 168.400, 168.500,
2	and 173.232, RSMo, are repealed and five new sections enacted
3	in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 163.172, 168.110,
4	168.400, 168.500, and 173.232, to read as follows:
	163.172. 1. As used in this section, the following
2	terms mean:
3	(1) "CPI", the Consumer Price Index for All Urban
4	Consumers for the United States as reported by the Bureau of
5	Labor Statistics, or its successor index;
6	(2) "CPI for the preceding calendar year", the average
7	of the CPI as of the close of the twelve-month period ending
8	on August thirty-first of such calendar year;
9	(3) "Percentage increase in inflation", the
10	percentage, if any, by which the CPI for the preceding
11	calendar year exceeds the CPI for the twelve-month period
12	beginning September 1, 2025, and ending August 31, 2026.
13	2. (1) In school year 1994-95 and thereafter until
14	school year 2006-07, the minimum teacher's salary shall be
15	eighteen thousand dollars. Beginning in school year 2006-
16	07, the minimum teacher's salary shall be twenty-two
17	thousand dollars; in school year 2007-08, the minimum

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18 teacher's salary shall be twenty-three thousand dollars; in 19 school year 2008-09, the minimum teacher's salary shall be 20 twenty-four thousand dollars; in school year 2009-10 and 21 [thereafter] in each subsequent school year through the 2024-22 25 school year, the minimum teacher's salary shall be twenty-23 five thousand dollars.

(2) For the 2025-26 school year and in all subsequent
 school years, the minimum teacher's salary shall be thirty eight thousand dollars.

27 (3) Beginning in the school year 1996-97 until school year 2006-07, for any full-time teacher with a master's 28 degree and at least ten years' teaching experience in a 29 30 public school or combination of public schools, the minimum salary shall be twenty-four thousand dollars. Beginning in 31 the school year 2006-07, for any full-time teacher with a 32 master's degree in an academic teaching field and at least 33 ten years' teaching experience in a public school or 34 combination of public schools, the minimum salary shall be 35 36 thirty thousand dollars; in the 2007-08 school year such minimum salary shall be thirty-one thousand dollars; in the 37 2008-09 school year such minimum salary shall be thirty-two 38 thousand dollars; and in the 2009-10 school year and in each 39 40 subsequent school year through the 2024-25 school year, such minimum salary shall be thirty-three thousand dollars. 41

(4) For the 2025-26 school year and in all subsequent school years, the minimum teacher's salary for any full-time teacher with a master's degree in an academic teaching field directly related to the teacher's assignment and at least ten years' teaching experience in a public school or combination of public schools shall be as follows:

48 (a) In the 2025-26 school year, forty-four thousand
 49 dollars;

In the 2026-27 school year, forty-five thousand 50 (b) 51 dollars; In the 2027-28 school year, forty-six thousand 52 (C) dollars; 53 In the 2028-29 school year, forty-seven thousand 54 (d) 55 dollars; and 56 For the 2029-30 school year and in all subsequent (e) 57 school years, forty-eight thousand dollars. 58 3. (1) In the 2026-27 school year and in all 59 subsequent school years, the minimum salary identified in subdivision (2) of subsection 2 of this section shall be 60 adjusted annually by the percentage increase in inflation. 61 In the 2030-31 school year and all subsequent 62 (2) 63 school years, the minimum salary identified in paragraph (e) 64 of subdivision (4) of subsection 2 of this section shall be adjusted annually by the percentage increase in inflation. 65 66 (3) The state board of education shall publish such minimum salaries annually beginning on or after January 1, 67 2026. Modifications to the minimum shall take effect on 68 July first of each calendar year. 69 [2. Beginning with the budget requests for fiscal year 70 71 1991,] 72 4. The commissioner of education shall present to the appropriate committees of the general assembly information 73 74 on the average Missouri teacher's salary, regional average 75 salary data, and national average salary data. 76 [3.] 5. All school salary information shall be public 77 information. [4.] 6. As used in this section, the term "salary" 78

79 shall be defined as the salary figure which appears on the 80 teacher's contract and as determined by the local school

81 district's basic salary schedule and does not include 82 supplements for extra duties.

[5.] 7. The minimum salary for any fully certificated
teacher employed on a less than full-time basis by a school
district, state school for the severely handicapped, the
Missouri School for the Deaf, or the Missouri School for the
Blind shall be prorated to reflect the amounts provided in
subsection [1] 2 of this section.

There is hereby created in the state treasury 89 8. (1) 90 the "Teacher Baseline Salary Grant Fund", which shall 91 consist of moneys appropriated under subsection 9 of this The state treasurer shall be custodian of the 92 section. In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the 93 fund. 94 state treasurer may approve disbursements. The fund shall 95 be a dedicated fund and, upon appropriation, moneys in this 96 fund shall be used solely to increase minimum teacher's 97 salaries as provided in this section.

98 (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 99 to the contrary, any moneys remaining in the fund at the end 100 of the biennium shall not revert to the credit of the 101 general revenue fund.

(3) The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the
fund in the same manner as other funds are invested. Any
interest and moneys earned on such investments shall be
credited to the fund.

9. (1) There is hereby created the "Teacher Baseline Salary Grant" program. The general assembly may appropriate amounts to the teacher baseline salary grant fund created in subsection 8 of this section. The total amount appropriated to such fund shall not exceed the amount necessary to assist each school district in increasing minimum teacher's

salaries to the minimum amount as required under this section.

(2) For the 2025-26, 2026-27, and 2027-28 school years, and subject to the appropriation of moneys to the teacher baseline salary grant fund, each school district may apply to the department of elementary and secondary education for a grant of moneys from the teacher baseline salary grant fund to assist such district in increasing minimum teacher's salaries as required under this section.

121 (3) Moneys granted to a school district under this 122 subsection shall not exceed seventy percent of the amount 123 necessary for such district to increase minimum teacher's salaries as required under this section. The remaining 124 125 thirty percent of the amount necessary for such district to 126 increase minimum teacher's salaries as required under this 127 section shall be allocated by such district from local 128 effort moneys received as calculated under this chapter.

129 (4) No grant shall be made from the teacher baseline
130 salary grant fund after June 30, 2028.

131 10. Subsections 8 and 9 of this section shall expire 132 on December 31, 2028.

168.110. 1. As used in this section, the following
2 terms mean:

3 (1) "Hard-to-staff schools", attendance centers where 4 the percentage of certificated positions in the attendance 5 center that were left vacant or were filled with a teacher 6 not fully qualified in the prior academic year exceeds five 7 percent as reported to the department of elementary and 8 secondary education;

9 (2) "Hard-to-staff subject areas", content areas for 10 which positions were left vacant or were filled with a 11 teacher not fully qualified in the prior academic year as

reported to the department of elementary and secondaryeducation.

14 2. The board of education of a school district may
15 modify an indefinite contract annually on or before the
16 fifteenth day of May in the following particulars:

17 (1) Determination of the date of beginning and length18 of the next school year;

19 (2) Fixing the amount of annual compensation for the
20 following school year as provided by the salary schedule
21 adopted by the board of education applicable to all
22 teachers.

The board of education of a school district may 23 3. 24 include differentiated placement of teachers on the salary schedule to increase compensation in order to recruit and 25 26 retain teachers in hard-to-staff subject areas or hard-to-27 staff schools. The board may annually review its hard-to-28 staff subject areas and hard-to-staff schools. No modifications to the identification of hard-to-staff subject 29 areas or hard-to-staff schools, or both, for the purpose of 30 placement on the salary schedule shall result in the 31 32 demotion of a teacher in the salary schedule.

4. Any salary schedule that includes differentiated
placement of teachers on the salary schedule under
subsection 3 of this section for hard-to-staff subject areas
or hard-to-staff schools, or both, shall be set prior to
approval by such board of education.

38 5. The modifications shall be effective at the
39 beginning of the next school year. All teachers affected by
40 the modification shall be furnished written copies of the
41 modifications within thirty days after their adoption by the
42 board of education.

Each school district that includes differentiated 43 6. 44 placement of teachers on the district salary schedule shall 45 annually provide to the department of elementary and secondary education a report containing the following 46 information: 47 48 (1) The salary schedule adopted by the district; 49 (2) The number of positions filled by differentiated 50 placement of teachers for hard-to-staff subject areas; 51 (3) The number of positions filled with differentiated 52 placement of teachers for hard-to-staff schools;

53 (4) The number of steps and additional compensation
54 that teachers with differentiated placement received for the
55 school year; and

56 (5) Any other relevant information required by the
 57 department.

168.400. 1. Sections 168.400 to 168.415 shall be
known and may be cited as the "Missouri Professional Teacher
and Administrator Act". This section shall become effective
September 1, 1988, and shall establish programs for the
following public school personnel:

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(1) The preservice teacher or student in training;

7 (2) The beginning teacher;

8 (3) The practicing teacher; and

9

(4) The administrator.

2. [Preservice teacher programs established under this
 section shall include, but need not be limited to, the
 following provisions:

(1) A program of entry-level testing of all
prospective teacher education students shall be established
at all colleges and universities offering approved teacher
education programs and, with the advice of the advisory
council as provided in section 168.015, shall be

18 administered by the commissioner of education, who shall 19 cause the department of elementary and secondary education 20 to develop or select such tests to establish abilities 21 necessary to receive a satisfactory rating, and to establish 22 procedures for the administering of the test;

(2) The entry-level tests developed under this
subsection shall include, but need not be limited to, an
examination of basic oral and written communication skills
and of basic mathematics skills, and may include both oral
and written examinations;

28 (3) Each prospective teacher education student shall
29 be required to obtain a satisfactory rating prior to
30 admission into the approved teacher education program;

31 The department of elementary and secondary (4)] education, with the advice of the advisory council as 32 provided in section 168.015, shall establish and monitor 33 exit requirements from approved teacher education programs 34 which shall be met by all preservice teacher education 35 36 students seeking certification in Missouri, and specific 37 criteria for a preservice teacher assessment that all candidates for certification shall meet. The preservice 38 teacher assessment established under this [subdivision] 39 40 subsection shall include, but need not be limited to, classroom achievement, practice teaching evaluation and 41 observation, successful participation in assessment centers, 42 43 interviews, tests and other evaluation measures. The 44 department of elementary and secondary education shall 45 promulgate rules to allow all preservice teacher education 46 students who have been employed for at least two years as teacher assistants to utilize their teacher assistant 47 experience to bypass the practice teaching evaluation and 48 observation process. These rules shall allow the certified 49

50 teacher working with the teacher assistant to observe and 51 evaluate the teacher assistant's practice teaching. No rule 52 or portion of a rule promulgated pursuant to the authority of this section shall become effective unless it has been 53 promulgated pursuant to chapter 536. The preservice teacher 54 assessment shall be reviewed by the certifying authority 55 prior to issuance of a certificate. An unsatisfactory 56 57 assessment shall result in the nonissuance of a certificate. Persons who are aggrieved by the nonissuance 58 59 of a certificate may appeal such nonissuance in the manner 60 provided in section 168.071. Any costs associated with [the 61 entry-level tests or] the exit requirements established 62 under this subsection shall be borne by each institution and costs defrayal included in the incidental fees charged to 63 the student. 64

3. Each approved teacher education program shall 65 require the faculty teaching preservice teacher education 66 67 courses to further their professional development through 68 direct personal involvement in the public schools in grades kindergarten through twelve on a periodic basis. As used in 69 this subsection, the term "faculty" shall include, but need 70 71 not be limited to, full- and part-time classroom instructors, and supervisors of practice teaching at 72 73 institutions offering an approved teacher education program.

4. Beginning teacher assistance programs established
under this section shall include, but need not be limited
to, the following provisions:

(1) Such programs shall require each school district
to provide a plan of professional development for the first
two years of teaching for any teacher who does not have
prior teaching experience. The professional development
plan shall include assistance from a professional

82 development committee, which is hereby established in each 83 school district, which committee shall work with beginning 84 teachers and experienced teachers in identifying instructional concerns and remedies; serve as a confidential 85 consultant upon a teacher's request; assess faculty needs 86 and develop in-service opportunities for school staff; and 87 88 present to the proper authority faculty suggestions, ideas 89 and recommendations pertaining to classroom instruction 90 within the school district. The members of each 91 professional development committee shall be selected by the teachers employed by the school district in question. 92 The professional development plan may include guidance from a 93 94 district-designated faculty member employed at a grade level comparable to the instructional grade level of the beginning 95 teacher, and such other forms of assistance which the school 96 district may choose to offer. The professional development 97 committee may apply to the state board of education for a 98 grant, which shall be in addition to any state aid provided 99 to the committee for activities identified in this 100 subdivision. The grant thus awarded shall be used by the 101 102 committee to provide in-service training to the teachers of 103 the district on teaching children identified as at risk of failing in school as defined in section 167.273. 104 The 105 department of elementary and secondary education shall provide resource materials and assist the committee if such 106 107 assistance is requested;

108 (2) Such programs shall include assistance from the
109 teacher education program which provided the teacher's
110 training if such training was provided in a Missouri college
111 or university. Such assistance from the college or
112 university may include retraining, internships, counseling,
113 and in-service training.

114 5. The practicing teacher assistance programs 115 established under this section shall include, but need not 116 be limited to, programs of professional development and improvement as provided for experienced teachers by the 117 professional development committee established under 118 119 subsection 4 of this section, and in-service opportunities 120 as provided by the local school district for all practicing 121 teachers.

6. (1) The administrator assistance programs
established under this section shall include, but shall not
be limited to, programs of professional development and
improvement for superintendents, principals, assistant
principals, and other school district personnel charged with
administrative duties.

128 (2) Establishment of programs by local districts and
129 organizations for the training of school board members are
130 encouraged and recommended.

For the purpose of providing career pay, 168.500. 1. 2 which shall be a salary supplement, for public school teachers, which for the purpose of sections 168.500 to 3 168.515 shall include classroom teachers, librarians, school 4 5 counselors and certificated teachers who hold positions as 6 school psychological examiners, parents as teachers 7 educators, school psychologists, special education 8 diagnosticians and speech pathologists, and are on the district salary schedule, there is hereby created and 9 10 established a career advancement program which shall be known as the "Missouri Career Development and Teacher 11 Excellence Plan", hereinafter known as the "career plan or 12 program". Participation by local school districts in the 13 career advancement program established under this section 14 shall be voluntary. The career advancement program is a 15

16 matching fund program. The general assembly may make an annual appropriation to the excellence in education fund 17 18 established under section 160.268 for the purpose of providing the state's portion for the career advancement 19 20 The "Career Ladder Forward Funding Fund" is hereby program. 21 established in the state treasury. Beginning with fiscal 22 year 1998 and until the career ladder forward funding fund 23 is terminated pursuant to this subsection, the general assembly may appropriate funds to the career ladder forward 24 25 funding fund. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, moneys in the fund shall not be 26 transferred to the credit of the general revenue fund at the 27 28 end of the biennium. All interest or other gain received from investment of moneys in the fund shall be credited to 29 the fund. All funds deposited in the fund shall be 30 31 maintained in the fund until such time as the balance in the 32 fund at the end of the fiscal year is equal to or greater 33 than the appropriation for the career ladder program for the 34 following year, at which time all such revenues shall be 35 used to fund, in advance, the career ladder program for such following year and the career ladder forward funding fund 36 37 shall thereafter be terminated.

38 2. The department of elementary and secondary
39 education, at the direction of the commissioner of
40 education, shall study and develop model career plans which
41 shall be made available to the local school districts.
42 These state model career plans shall:

43 (1) Contain three steps or stages of career44 advancement;

45 (2) Contain a detailed procedure for the admission of46 teachers to the career program;

47 (3) Contain specific criteria for career step qualifications and attainment. These criteria shall clearly 48 describe the minimum number of professional responsibilities 49 required of the teacher at each stage of the plan and shall 50 51 include reference to classroom performance evaluations performed pursuant to section 168.128. The criteria may 52 include, but shall not be limited to, teacher externships as 53 54 provided in section 168.025;

55 (4) Be consistent with the teacher certification 56 process recommended by the Missouri advisory council of 57 certification for educators and adopted by the department of 58 elementary and secondary education;

(5) Provide that public school teachers in Missouri 59 shall become eligible to apply for admission to the career 60 plans adopted under sections 168.500 to 168.515 after two 61 years of public school teaching in Missouri. All teachers 62 seeking admission to any career plan shall, as a minimum, 63 meet the requirements necessary to obtain the first 64 65 renewable professional certificate as provided in section 168.021; 66

67 (6) Provide procedures for appealing decisions made
68 under career plans established under sections 168.500 to
69 168.515.

70 3. School district career plans shall recognize 71 additional responsibilities and volunteer efforts by 72 teachers in formulating criteria for career ladder admission and stage achievement. Such additional responsibilities and 73 74 volunteer efforts [shall be required to occur outside of compensated hours and] outside of the duties that require a 75 76 teaching certificate under section 168.021 may include, but 77 shall not be limited to:

78 (1) Serving as a coach, supervisor, or organizer for
79 any extracurricular activity for which the teacher does not
80 already receive additional compensation;

81 (2) Serving as a mentor for students, whether in a82 formal or informal capacity;

83 (3) Receiving additional teacher training or84 certification outside of that offered by the school district;

85 (4) Serving as a tutor or providing additional86 learning opportunities to students; and

87 (5) Assisting students with postsecondary education
88 preparation including, but not limited to, teaching an ACT
89 or SAT preparation course or assisting students with
90 completing college or career school admission or financial
91 assistance applications.

92 4. The commissioner of education shall cause the
93 department of elementary and secondary education to
94 establish guidelines for all career plans established under
95 this section, and criteria that must be met by any school
96 district which seeks funding for its career plan.

A participating local school district may have the 97 5. option of implementing a career plan developed by the 98 99 department of elementary and secondary education or a local 100 plan which has been developed with advice from teachers 101 employed by the district and which has met with the approval 102 of the department of elementary and secondary education. In 103 approving local career plans, the department of elementary 104 and secondary education may consider provisions in the plan of the local district for recognition of teacher mobility 105 from one district to another within this state. 106

107 6. The career plans of local school districts shall
108 not discriminate on the basis of race, sex, religion,
109 national origin, color, creed, or age. Participation in the

110 career plan of a local school district is optional, and any 111 teacher who declines to participate shall not be penalized 112 in any way.

7. In order to receive funds under this section, a 113 school district which is not subject to section 162.920 must 114 115 have a total levy for operating purposes which is in excess 116 of the amount allowed in Section 11(b) of Article X of the 117 Missouri Constitution; and a school district which is subject to section 162.920 must have a total levy for 118 119 operating purposes which is equal to or in excess of twenty-120 five cents on each hundred dollars of assessed valuation.

The commissioner of education shall cause the 8. 121 122 department of elementary and secondary education to regard a 123 speech pathologist who holds both a valid certificate of 124 license to teach and a certificate of clinical competence to 125 have fulfilled the standards required to be placed on stage 126 III of the career program, provided that such speech pathologist has been employed by a public school in Missouri 127 128 for at least two years and is approved for placement at such stage III by the local school district. 129

130 Beginning in fiscal year 2012, the state portion of 9. career ladder payments shall only be made available to local 131 school districts if the general assembly makes an 132 133 appropriation for such program. Payments authorized under 134 sections 168.500 to 168.515 shall only be made available in 135 a year for which a state appropriation is made. Any state appropriation shall be made prospectively in relation to the 136 year in which work under the program is performed. 137

138 10. Nothing in this section shall be construed to
139 prohibit a local school district from funding the program
140 for its teachers for work performed in years for which no
141 state appropriation is made available.

173.232. 1. There is hereby established the "[Urban 2 Flight and Rural Needs] Teacher Recruitment and Retention 3 State Scholarship Program", which shall be administered by the department of elementary and secondary education. 4 The 5 program shall, upon appropriation, provide scholarships, 6 subject to the eligibility criteria enumerated in this 7 section, for eligible students who enter a teacher education 8 program and make a commitment to teach as a condition of 9 receiving such scholarship.

10 2. Subject to appropriation, each year the department of elementary and secondary education shall make available 11 to eligible students [up to one hundred four-year urban 12 flight and rural needs] scholarships for up to two years in 13 an amount that encompasses one hundred percent of the total 14 cost of eligible students' tuition and fees at a four-year 15 college or university located in Missouri. Such amount 16 17 shall be paid by funds appropriated to the department. The maximum number of scholarships made available under this 18 section shall be as follows: 19

20 (1) For academic years ending before July 1, 2025, one
 21 hundred;

22 For the 2025-26 academic year, two hundred; (2) For the 2026-27 academic year, two hundred twenty; 23 (3) 24 (4) For the 2027-28 academic year, two hundred forty; For the 2028-29 academic year, two hundred sixty; 25 (5) For the 2029-30 academic year, two hundred eighty; 26 (6) 27 and For the 2030-31 academic year and all subsequent 28 (7)

29 academic years, three hundred.

30 3. As used in this section, the [term] following terms
31 mean:

32 (1) "Eligible student" [shall mean], an individual who:

33 [(1)] (a) Is a United States citizen and a Missouri
34 resident who attended a Missouri high school;

35 [(2)] (b) Enters and makes a commitment to pursue a 36 teacher education program approved by the department of 37 elementary and secondary education and offered by a four-38 year college or university located in Missouri;

39 [(3)] (c) Signs an agreement with the department of 40 elementary and secondary education in which the recipient agrees to teach in a Missouri public school[, the population 41 42 of which includes a higher-than-average "at-risk student population", as such term shall be defined by the department 43 of elementary and secondary education, ] that is a hard-to-44 staff school or to teach at least one hard-to-staff subject 45 area in a Missouri public school that offers classes in hard-46 to-staff subject areas, or both, for two years for every one 47 year the recipient received the [urban flight and rural 48 49 needs] scholarship;

50 [(4) Has graduated from high school with a cumulative 51 grade point average of at least two and one-half on a four-52 point scale or equivalent;

53 (5)] (d) Maintains a cumulative grade point average of
54 at least two and one-half on a four-point scale or
55 equivalent; and

(e) For scholarships awarded for any academic year
beginning after June 30, 2025, has made a good faith effort
to first secure all available federal sources of grant
funding that could be applied to the total cost of such
student's eligible tuition and fees as described in
subsection 2 of this section;

62 (2) "Hard-to-staff schools", attendance centers where
63 the percentage of certificated positions in the attendance
64 center that were left vacant or were filled with a teacher

not fully qualified in the prior academic year exceeds five
percent as reported to the department of elementary and
secondary education;

(3) "Hard-to-staff subject areas", content areas for
which positions were left vacant or were filled with a
teacher not fully qualified in the prior academic year as
reported to the department of elementary and secondary
education.

4. If the number of applicants exceeds the number of
scholarships or revenues available, the department of
elementary and secondary education may consider the
financial needs of the applicant.

5. The scholarships provided in this section shall be
available to [otherwise] eligible students who [either] meet
at least one of the following:

[Are currently enrolled in a community college and 80 (1)81 make a commitment to pursue a teacher education program approved by the department of elementary and secondary 82 83 education and offered by a four-year college or university located in Missouri; or] Have successfully completed two 84 years at a community college with a minimum of forty-eight 85 credit hours and a grade point average of at least two and 86 87 one-half on a four-point scale or the equivalent;

88 (2) Have been awarded an associate degree or the
89 equivalent; or

90 (3) Have completed their baccalaureate degree [and
91 agree to enter a teacher education program and make a
92 commitment to pursue a teacher education program approved by
93 the department of elementary and secondary education and
94 offered by a four-year college or university located in
95 Missouri].

96 6. (1) Every eligible student receiving scholarships 97 under this section shall teach in an elementary or secondary public school in Missouri as provided in paragraph (c) of 98 subdivision [(3)] (1) of subsection 3 of this section. 99 The 100 student shall teach for a period of two years for every one 101 year [he or she] such student received [an urban flight and rural needs] a scholarship under this section; otherwise, 102 103 the scholarship shall be treated as a loan to the eligible 104 student[, and interest at the rate of nine and one-half 105 percent per year]. Interest shall be charged on the unpaid 106 balance of the amount received from the date the eligible 107 student ceases to teach until the amount received is paid 108 The interest rate shall be adjusted back to the state. 109 annually and shall be equal to one percentage point over the 110 prevailing United States prime rate in effect on January 111 first of such year.

112 (2) In order to provide for the servicing of such loans, the department of elementary and secondary education 113 114 may sell such loans to the higher education loan authority of the state of Missouri created pursuant to sections 115 173.350 to 173.445. For each year the student teaches, up 116 to eight years, one-eighth of the amount received pursuant 117 to this section shall be applied against the total amount 118 119 received and shall not be subject to the repayment requirement of this section; provided that twenty-five 120 121 percent of such amount, not subject to repayment, shall be repaid by the local school district to the department. 122

(3) The department of elementary and secondary
education shall have the power to and shall defer interest
and principal payments under certain circumstances, which
shall include, but need not be limited to, the enrollment in

127 a graduate program or service in any branch of the Armed128 Forces of the United States.

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There is hereby established in the state treasury a 129 7. 130 fund to be known as the "[Urban Flight and Rural Needs] Teacher Recruitment and Retention State Scholarship Program 131 132 Fund", which shall consist of all moneys that may be 133 appropriated to it by the general assembly, and in addition 134 may include any gifts, contributions, grants, or bequests received from federal, state, private, or other sources. 135 136 The fund shall be administered by the department of elementary and secondary education. Notwithstanding the 137 provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, moneys in the 138 139 fund shall not be transferred to the credit of the general 140 revenue fund at the end of the biennium. Interest and moneys earned on the fund shall be credited to the fund. 141 142 Moneys in the fund shall be used solely for the purpose of 143 awarding scholarships under the provisions of this section.

An individual who has qualified as an eligible 144 8. student under this section shall continue to qualify as an 145 146 eligible student for purposes of paragraph (c) of 147 subdivision (1) of subsection 3 of this section as long as such individual remains employed by the school district in 148 149 which such individual agrees to teach regardless of whether 150 such individual's employing school no longer qualifies as a hard-to-staff school, such class taught by such individual 151 no longer qualifies as a hard-to-staff subject area, or such 152 individual's position within the school district changes. 153

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
